County insurance accecpted

The Nicholas County Fiscal Court held a special meeting on Wednesday. The concise meeting did have a big outcome as the insurance rates for county employees were decided. The committee set up to research the insurance met several times before coming to a recommendation.

recommendation was to go with M. C. Blair Insurance and Steven Parish Insurance. The plan recommended includes health, life and prescription card H. It is a 10/40/60 plan. What that means is that prescriptions are on scales with \$10 being for generics, followed by \$40 and \$60, with 25% due up to \$150 set at a maximum of \$2500. After which the insurance picks up 100

percent. The amount that the employees pay in each month will be \$25.07. The total cost per employee is \$339.05 per month with the county paying the amount not paid by each

employee. The insurance is considered to be better than the previous insurance which was a 10/40/70 plan, yet the cost will be similar. The dental and vision plan will be dropped. Cost to employees will be the same in 2012 as it

was in 2011. The members of the Fiscal Court all voted to accept the new insurance plan.

The only other item on the agenda was a resolution allowing County Judge Executive Kenny Lyons to sign an agreement with the state in regards to extra money for the Watkins Lane Project. The state contribution will now be \$37,150. All members of the Fiscal Court voted to allow Mr. Lyons to sign the agreement. After which the meeting was adjourned.

Home Safety Tips: Generator Safety

Many households run generators during a power outage and homeowners should take extra precautions to avoid injury. Gasoline or diesel fuel powered generators can produce potentially deadly levels of carbon monoxide and should be operated only in wellventilated, covered, unheated areas – never inside. You should always practice extreme caution when using a generator to power your home:

Make sure the generator is listed by an independent testing organization, such as Underwriter's Laboratory (UL).

Protect the generator from exposure to rain, but under no circumstances should generators be used indoors, including a garage. Do not operate the generator near any open windows or doorways.

Before using a generator, make sure you have installed a carbon monoxide (CO) alarm near sleeping areas to alert you in the event of increased levels of CO in your home.

Never connect a generator to the home's electrical system; instead, plug what you want to power directly into the generator.

Always follow the manufacturer's lines and maintenance schedule.

Cormac McCarthey has become a favorite of late.

One of my favorites of all time, particularly from my youth, is Stephen King: I read all of his works up until the mid 1990's and then grew tired of his newest works as it seemed he was just cranking them out without any real focus.

But he's still a favorite and I'm sure before the year ends I'll add to my immense King collection.

King's formula learning to write well is: "Read and write four to six hours a day. If you cannot find the time for that, you can't expect to become a good writer." He also has a simple def-

inition for talent in writing: "If you wrote something for which someone sent you a check, if you cashed the check and it didn't bounce, and if you then paid the light bill with the money, I consider vou talented.'

Nicely put Mr. King. And so we enter a new year, dear reader.
