## Indictments returned by grand jury

Members of a Nicholas County Grand Jury met Jan. 5 and returned felony indictments on several individuals.

Steven Stull, 56, was indicted on the charge of sexual abuse, 1st degree. According to the indictment, the alleged charge occurred on Sept. 1 of 2011 when Stull committed the offense and when being in a position of authority or special trust as defined in (Kentucky Revised Statutes) 532.045, he subjected a minor who was less than 18 years of age to sexual contact.

The indictment was issued following the testimony of Kentucky State Police Trooper Eric Barnett.

Brandon Kimes, 22, John Farrow, 34, and Samuel Jones, 37, were indicted on the charges of burglary, 2nd degree (three counts), theft

by unlawful taking, (two counts) and one count of burglary, 3rd degree. The three men allegedly committed the offenses on Nov. 29 of last year when they unlawfully entered dwellings of Robert Young, William Berger, Billy King Anderson and David Smith. They allegedly removed items from the dwellings of Young, Smith and Berger. Jones was additionally indicted on the charge of persistent felony offender, 1st degree. According to the indictment against Jones, he has "been convicted of two or more felonies" in the past. Christopher McCarty is listed as a co-defendant on the indictments of Kimes, Farrow and Jones, but no additional information about McCarty was provided on the indictments, which were issued following the testimony of Nicholas County Sheriff Jeff Sidles.

Elizabeth Caldwell, 27, and Kimberly Tipton, 24,

were indicted as codefendants. Both were indicted on the charges of burglary, 2nd degree and theft by unlawful taking (\$500 or more but less than \$10,000). The indictments against the two women allege that on Nov. 18 & 19 of last year, the two unlawfully entered and took movable property from a dwelling belonging to Eric and Shannon Myers. Eric Fulton and Ricky Vice were listed as "codefendants" in the case but no additional details were provided in the indictment, which were issued following the testimony of Nicholas County Sheriff Jeff Sidles.

Bobby Darrell Purvis, Jr., 27 and Sarah Jones, 24 were indicted on the charges of criminal possession of a forged instrument, 2nd degree (four counts each). According to the indictments, three of the alleged offenses occurred on Sept. 12 of last year and one occurred

the next day. The indictments allege that Purvis passed four checks from the account of William Bentley, with the amounts totaling \$2,250, and Jones passed four additional checks from the account of Bentley totaling \$1,075. The indictments were issued following the testimony of Carlisle Chief of Police Darrell Layne.

Christopher Hunt, 37, was indicted on the charge of flagrant non support by "persistently failing to provide support for his minor child." Hunt has accumulated arrearages of \$1,000 or more, according to the indictment.

Cortney Fletcher, 23, was indicted on the charge of flagrant non support "persistently failing to provide support for his minor child." Fletcher has accumulated an arrearage of \$1,000 or more, according to the indictment.

An indictment is a pro-

cedural step in the judicial system that generally moves a case from the district court level to the circuit court level and is not to be considered an indication of guilt. All persons are considered innocent until proven guilty or pleading guilty.

## Animal shelter advisory board tops agenda of latest fiscal court meeting

The latest meeting of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court was dominated by discussion over the creation of an animal control board to create policy for the county's animal shelter.

All members were present for last Tuesday evening's meeting, including Judge Executive Kenney Lyons, Commissioners Steve Hamilton, Jeff Randolph, Darvin Mitchell, Jimmy Wells, and Mike Webb, secretary Da-

na Price, treasurer Wanda Dotson, and county attorney Dawn Letcher.

The idea for a board followed after a recent incident in which the shelter was responsible for the euthanization of two dogs that had an owner who was not notified. There have also been concerns about the shelter being open to unregulated volunteer activity.

Judge Lyons said that the board "will focus on the day-to-day operations [of the shelter], but big decisions will be made by the court."

Commissioner Ham-

ilton expressed concern over the board's title, "animal control advisory board." "What does 'control' mean," Hamilton asked, expressing concern that the board may be given too much authority.

Attorney Letcher reassured him that the board would do no more than come up with suggestions and proposals for the court and would have no extra authority. She stressed that it was important to first establish the board.

Veterinarian Dr. Walker Logan spoke court and

## County faces law suit

A man who was injured at the Nicholas County Recycling Center last year has filed a suit against the county in Nicholas Circuit Court.

Attorneys for William Dean Plunkett filed a negligence suit against the county and most of the elected officials of

the county, almost one year to the day of his accident.

On Jan. 15 of last year, Plunkett fell from the bed of his truck into a recycling bin at the recycling center and suffered injuries to his neck, spine, ribs and clavicle, according to court documents.

The court documents claim the center lacked proper warnings, proper

safety devices and other deficiencies. Plunkett is attempting to gain financial compensation for his injuries, loss of future income, punitive damages and compensation for mental anguish as well as physical discomfort.

The Mercury will continue to follow the civil suit as it progresses through Nicholas Circuit Court.

said that an advisory board would likely have to address a number of issues, including policy regarding quarantines, reclaiming dogs, adoptions, how the county falls under state animal control laws, health concerns in a shelter, training for the animal control officer,

managing volunteers, and shelter hours.

"There's not one of us in this court who knows how to run an animal shelter," she said.

Hamilton continued to express concern on the operations of the shelter under the proposed advisory board. "What hap-

pens to these dogs after 10 days? Who is going to take care of them from day 10 to day 30," he asked, referring to a suggestion that adoptions can up to 30 days. He and Commissioner Wells also said that the pens needed to be locked and schedules

## Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

**Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky**

"The grief and lamentations of poor old William Turner, is still fresh in my remembrance, lamenting the loss of his children, his two sons George and William, that lay there tomahawked and scalped, and his beloved daughter Betsy, a beautiful girl of fourteen years of age, taken captive by the cruel savages; not knowing what she had suffered or might hereafter suffer. This grief can be better conceived by tender parents than described."

From the autobiographical narrative of Captain Spencer Records, as was written by his own hand in 1842 and as it appears in the Lyman Copeland Draper Manuscripts in volume 23 CC

Along Arthur Fox's Creek, in what would one day become eastern Fleming County, in January of 1786.

Spencer Records and

his companions eagerly sought the buffalo for the very life it provided them.

The once-immense herds of thousands had roamed the Licking River at the Upper and Lower Blue Licks only a decade before. Now reduced to scattered herds consisting of a few hundred at best, even these were beginning to disappear.

Spencer, his brother John, and two others had ridden their horses and led several other pack horses eastward from the communities around Captain Simon Kenton's Station near Washington, in Mason County.

They were in Indian country now. No settlements for at least 30 miles save Captain John Burke's Station. They had heard of Burke's Station, located somewhere near the mouth of Locust Creek, but none of them had any idea exactly where it was, so there could be no expect-

ed assistance from anyone from that station if they happened to get in a bad way.

They stayed sharp and alert, sleeping without a fire if they bothered sleeping at all.

That was fine with Spencer as he tended to have nightmares when he slept.

Neither the Shawnee nor any of the other northern Native American tribes usually came south of the Ohio River during winter, but Spencer wasn't willing to risk their lives by being sloppy, lazy and inattentive.

He had only last month, on Dec. 11, celebrated his 23rd birthday. He planned on celebrating another next year and so on until he reached old age.

Such things were contingent upon a sharp mind and a strong will to survive along the frontier and that was something that Spencer was well educated on.

Spencer's father, Josiah Records, had been a militia officer from the old pre-Revolutionary War days along the frontier of Pennsylvania; days that saw horrors inflicted by both Native Americans and frontiers-

men alike.

His uncle Joseph Eckley, who had married his father's sister Susanna, had been killed in 1782, fighting by the side of David Andrews and his company in what would come to be known as Colonel Crawford's Defeat.

It was one thing for Kentucky frontiersmen to come to the wilderness and hear stories of atrocities, but it was much different for Spencer. He had seen those atrocities with his own eyes and buried the victims and mourned family members who were killed.

He still had nightmares about burying his former schoolmates along Peter's Creek back east. Ten of his schoolmates, young couples, five girls and five young men, had been attacked. The girls were never seen again. The boys tortured and killed. Spencer had found their remains only one mile from his family's home, and had helped dig the graves.

Only a few days later he had discovered the remains of a family that met a similar fate.

It had changed him. It had made him hard as a teenager and he carried that hardness

throughout his adulthood.

His father along with himself and two of his brothers-in-law: James and Quontromos Finch, were very adept blacksmiths and millwrights, who kept pushing further west, constructing mills and moving on once the mills were sold, new

land farther west was purchased. And so it had eventually come to pass that land was purchased in Kentucky, near the community of Washington, and they built the second cabin ever constructed there.

Sickness brought about through hunger and

should be in place for volunteers at the shelter.

Judge Lyons said that he had a list of names of people proposed for serving on the board, but that this will be held back until the January 20th meeting of the fiscal court.

Instead, the court established that the following positions be represented on the advisory board: a veterinarian, Sheriff's Office, animal rescue, an attorney, a grant writer, 2 citizens at large, and a magistrate. The composition of the board will also make sure that all of the magistrates' districts are represented.

The court approved the establishment of the advisory board with a 4 to 1 vote, with Hamilton voting no.

The court heard a presentation from Mike Edwards and Dan Renault, representatives of Corisoft, a GPS monitoring system used for tracking criminal defendants who are out on pretrial

release or who are given an alternative to being housed in jail.

Attorney Letcher said that Nicholas County was one of the first counties in the state to take part in a pilot program with the company. There is no cost to the county, and the program ends this month. Letcher said that there are presently 9 active participants in the program in the county who are primarily on pre-trial release.

Mike Edwards said that the purpose of Corisoft is not only to monitor offenders but to also help them rehabilitate their lives, in a cost-effective way.

The technology uses both ankle bracelets and smart phones to have defendants keep in touch with a monitoring center. The company also works with spousal and child support agencies, drug rehabilitation, education, and employment agencies.

"We keep these people out of the system," Edwards said, pointing to a statistic that shows that 67% of 50 participants statewide have found

full-time employment with Corisoft's help.

Corisoft requested that the county continued to use their services within the justice system. The cost would be \$10 a day per participant or \$14 a day if the bracelet and phones were used with the system. The average cost to keep someone in a local jail is around \$30 a day.

Edwards said that his company liked to "turn tax takers into tax payers."

Attorney Letcher said that she would consider putting together an agreement with Corisoft, and the proposal would be tabled until the January 20th meeting.

In other actions, court members approved an amended 2012 budget, approved a revision to the budget to increase the amount allotted to the Soil Conservation District, discussed the burning of a barn, approved the annual compensation schedule, agreed to look into plans and price quotes for a new equipment shed, approved a resolution to make bridge repairs on

Locust Grove Rd., approved a resolution to give Judge Lyons permission to sign over a 2008 grant that wasn't used by the city to District 2, and agreed to discuss a public nuisance ordinance at the January 20th meeting.

The next regular meeting of the fiscal court is scheduled for Friday, January 20, at 9 a. m.

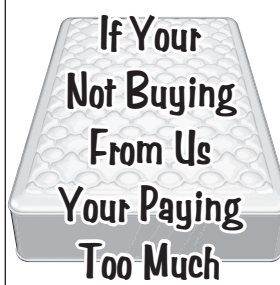
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### Congratulations Are In Order!

starvation was as true a threat to them as Native American raids, and thus Spencer had insisted on making this dangerous but necessary trip so far from home to acquire the buffalo.

The meat was prized above all others, but almost as importantly, the hide was treasured. The course wool could be removed and spun into clothing-strong clothing, that didn't tear every whip stitch. And the hairless hide was unequaled when it came to making shoe leather and moccasins.

The four buffalo hunters scattered out along the small knolls that overlooked the vast valley system around Fox Creek. Far enough apart to maximize the hunting potential yet close enough to hear gunfire and be of assistance if needed.

It was growing dusk when Spencer saw his first buffalo cow. It was a good one and a single shot through its heart dropped

it where it had stood. He gutted the beast and cut out the heart. On his way to camp he spotted a second buffalo cow, the largest he had ever seen and again with a single, well-placed shot, the animal fell motionless. He was chewing on its warm heart as he approached camp and saw the smiles on the faces of his companions. They divided up the fresh buffalo hearts and returned to the kill sites. They cut off the heads of the enormous beasts, then, carefully they placed the entire carcass of the first cow backwards on one of the packhorse after breaking the buffalo's spine, so the carcass would hang evenly over the horse. They did the same with the second, larger buffalo cow.

They covered the bloodied snow with evergreen limbs, just as a precautionary measure before they began moving cautiously westward, moving back from whence they came. The wolves were circling but they did not fire at them for fear of being found by a stray Native American hunting party.

Perhaps he would sleep peacefully tonight. Perhaps the nightmares would not come as they so often did. He sliced the last of the buffalo heart, tossed his brother John the bigger piece and devoured the last slice. It was still warm and it tasted good. He glanced back and saw the wolves swarming over where the last buffalo had been gutted.

It began to snow. \* We will rejoin Spencer Records and his family and friends in future columns, if the Good Lord is willing, dear reader.

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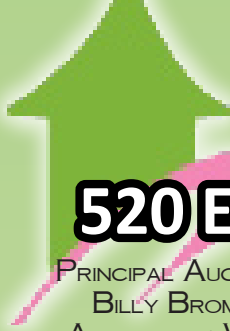
