Spencer, his brother John, and two others had ridden their horses and led several other pack horses eastward from the communities around Captain Simon Kenton's Station near Washington, in Mason County.

They were in Indian country now. No settlements for at least 30 miles save Captain John Burke's Station. They had heard of Burke's Station, located somewhere near the mouth of Locust Creek, but none of them had any idea exactly where it was, so there could be no expect-

release or who are given an alternative to being housed in jail.

Attorney Letcher said that Nicholas County was one of the first counties in the state to take part in a pilot program with the company. There is no cost to the county, and the program ends this month. Letcher said that there are presently 9 active participants in the program in the county who are primarily on pre-trial release.

Mike Edwards said that the purpose of Corisoft is not only to monitor offenders but to also help them rehabilitate their lives, in a cost-effective way.

The technology uses both ankle bracelets and smart phones to have defendants keep in touch with a monitoring center. The company also works with spousal and child support agencies, drug rehabilitation, education, and employment agencies.

"We keep these people out of the system," Edwards said, pointing to a statistic that shows that 67% of 50 participants statewide have found

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
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## Congratulations Are In Order!

starvation was as true a threat to them as Native American raids, and thus Spencer had insisted on making this dangerous but necessary trip so far from home to acquire the buffalo.

The meat was prized above all others, but almost as importantly, the hide was treasured. The course wool could be removed and spun into clothing-strong clothing, that didn't tear every whip stitch. And the hairless hide was unequaled when it came to making shoe leather and mocca-

The four buffalo hunters scattered out along the small knolls that overlooked the vast valley system around Fox Creek. Far enough apart to maximize the hunting potential yet close enough to hear gunfire and be of assistance if needed.

It was growing dusk when Spencer saw his first buffalo cow. It was a good one and a single shot through its heart dropped

it where it had stood. He gutted the beast and cut out the heart. On his way to camp he spotted a second buffalo cow, the largest he had ever seen and again with a single, well-placed shot, the animal fell motionless. He was chewing on its warm heart as he approached camp and saw the smiles on the faces of his companions. They divided up the fresh buffalo hearts and returned to the kill sites. They cut off the heads of the enormous beasts, then, carefully they placed the entire carcass of the first cow backwards on one of the packhorse after breaking the buffalo's spine, so the carcass would hang evenly over the horse. They did the same with the second, larger buffalo cow.

They covered the bloodied snow with evergreen limbs, just as a precautionary measure before they began moving cautiously westward, moving back from whence they came. The wolves were circling but they did not fire at them for fear of being found by a stray Native American hunting party.

Perhaps he would sleep peacefully tonight. Perhaps the nightmares would not come as they so often did. He sliced the last of the buffalo heart, tossed his brother John the bigger piece and devoured the last slice. It was still warm and it tasted good. He glanced back and saw the wolves swarming over where the last buffalo had been gutted.

It began to snow.
