## Foul smell causes scare but there was no danger

Many residents of Carlisle received a scare last week, fearing that a natural gas leak had occurred. However the scare was nothing but that, a scare, there was never any danger. The smell was caused by a garbage truck crushing a five gallon container that contained methyl mercaptan. The contain-

er was in the old city barn. It contained trace amounts of mercaptan and was filled with water over twenty years ago, and forgotten for years.

Methyl mercaptan is a colorless gas with a smell like rotten cabbage. It is a natural substance found in the blood, brain, and other tissues of people and animals. It is released from animal feces. It occurs naturally in cer-

tain foods, such as some nuts and cheese.

It is also used to add an odor to natural gas, since in its normal state natural gas is both odorless and colorless. It is used as a warning to alert people of a gas leak.

That smell alerted many people as there were an overwhelming number of phone calls to dispatch. Mayor Kevin Booth said, "I applaud

the citizens of Carlisle and the conscious effort and diligence that they showed. People thought it was a major gas leak and made sure to notify emergency officials.

The next step was to determine the cleanup of the truck. The E.P.A. said that they city could clean it out themselves; however Mayor Booth used PECCO (Perdue Environmental Contracting Company). Booth stated that if the city had cleaned it, then the run off would have to be placed in a container and could result in this happening again in the distant future, and he would not subject a future mayor to having to deal with it.

The E.P.A. applauded the city of Carlisle on their handling of the situation. There will be no fines imposed due to the fact that no one tried to

hide anything. Accidents happen and there was never a hazardous situation. According to city officials the members of the E.P.A. stated that the city went above and beyond with the way that they handled the situation.

Mayor Kevin Booth speaking on behalf of the

city of Carlisle issued a sincere apology to the citizens for any inconvenience that was caused. He also wanted to thank the city workers for their hard work and dedication, stating that within twenty-four hours of the incident that everything was cleaned and disposed of properly.

## Save a Lot may get new building

Many residents of Carlisle and Nicholas County have been asking the same question, "When will Save a Lot be here?"

After a meeting Wednesday that answer is one step closer. According to members of the Saver Cooperation the plan is to begin a ground breaking around the middle of March with it being completed approximately 90 to 120 days later. The group has been working diligently to get the store here and opened. So far they have already completed the topography and removed the asbestos from the Jockey Building, at a cost of approximately \$103,000.

The biggest surprise from the meeting is that

located in the Jockey Building.

The cost of creating a parking lot to the right of the existing building may make it more economical-ly feasible to build an entirely new building.

The fact that is may be cheaper to build than to redo the existing structure is due in part to the amount of electrical,

plumbing work, along with the cost of grading the parking lot.

The group is looking into building a 109x160 foot building, approximately 16,900 sq. ft.

That would give a 5,000 sq. ft. back room, and 12,000 sq. ft. sales floor.

The group is also looking into renting the space in the existing building for storage space.

**Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky**

"And I don't cry for yesterday  
There's an ordinary world  
Somehow I have to find

To the ordinary world  
I will learn to survive"  
From the song "Ordinary World" which was written in 1992 by Simon Lebon, of the band; Duran Duran.

"We should, at all times of trouble, trial or difficulty, put our trust in the Lord, who alone is able to save all that put their trust in him."

A commonly used phrase of Captain Spencer Records, in his biographical narrative, as it appears in Volume 23 CC page 23, of the Lyman Copeland Draper Manuscripts.

Winter, 1783, along the ancient Native American footpath called the Atlato-Oh-Waimee, near present-day Cynthiana, Ky., two miles from the burnt ruins of Captain Isaac Ruddle's Fort.

The snow swirled crazily about them in near hypnotic fashion.

"Lord have mercy, look at that woman," Spencer Records said in a tight whisper to his cousins; Josiah and John Finch, as the trio slowly walked out of the woods and joined their companion Henry Fry. Henry was simply staring at the woman who lay before him. "These people are so poor they don't even have a blanket to stretch over that old sick wom-

an."

Old Mrs. Downey was lying in the snow.

The snow around her was almost knee-deep.

She was pale and her frozen breath hung just above her mouth, catching like little wisps of smoke as she breathed sporadically.

In all there were about

a dozen lost souls, half frozen in that small clearing near the woods. Some of them huddled near Mrs. Downey and others seemed to lurch about numbly a short distance away, staring off toward the horizon.

Most of them were half-naked children belonging to the Downey, Reeves and Dewitt, families, a group who were lost in the woods and had wandered for weeks from Limestone Point (Maysville), while looking for Bryant's Station.

"Get your axes out boys," Henry Fry said to them in his make-believe commanding voice, imitating Spencer's father who was a stern militia officer. He only did that when he was really scared.

"I reckon it's time we got busy."

The four young men got a fire started and then chopped and cut straight and forked poles and built a makeshift shelter and elevated bed for Mrs. Downey.

They'd told the group

that they would all ride the storm out here and go directly to Bryant's Station in the morning. They hoped to arrive there by tomorrow night.

The only problem was that they themselves had no idea where Bryant's Station was.

They hadn't been able to find a single soul since wandering into Kentucky last week.

Their group came down the Monongahela River and thence into the Ohio River on a flatboat. The group consisted of him-

self, his father Josiah, his uncle Henry Finch and his cousins Henry and Josiah Finch. They were also accompanied by William Kiser, the man who sold them land in Kentucky and with whom they were helping transport a load of merchandise and cattle. Their own cargo, including cattle and horses, made for a cumbersome journey. A flatboat, with a pirogue and a canoe were the three primary boats the party used.

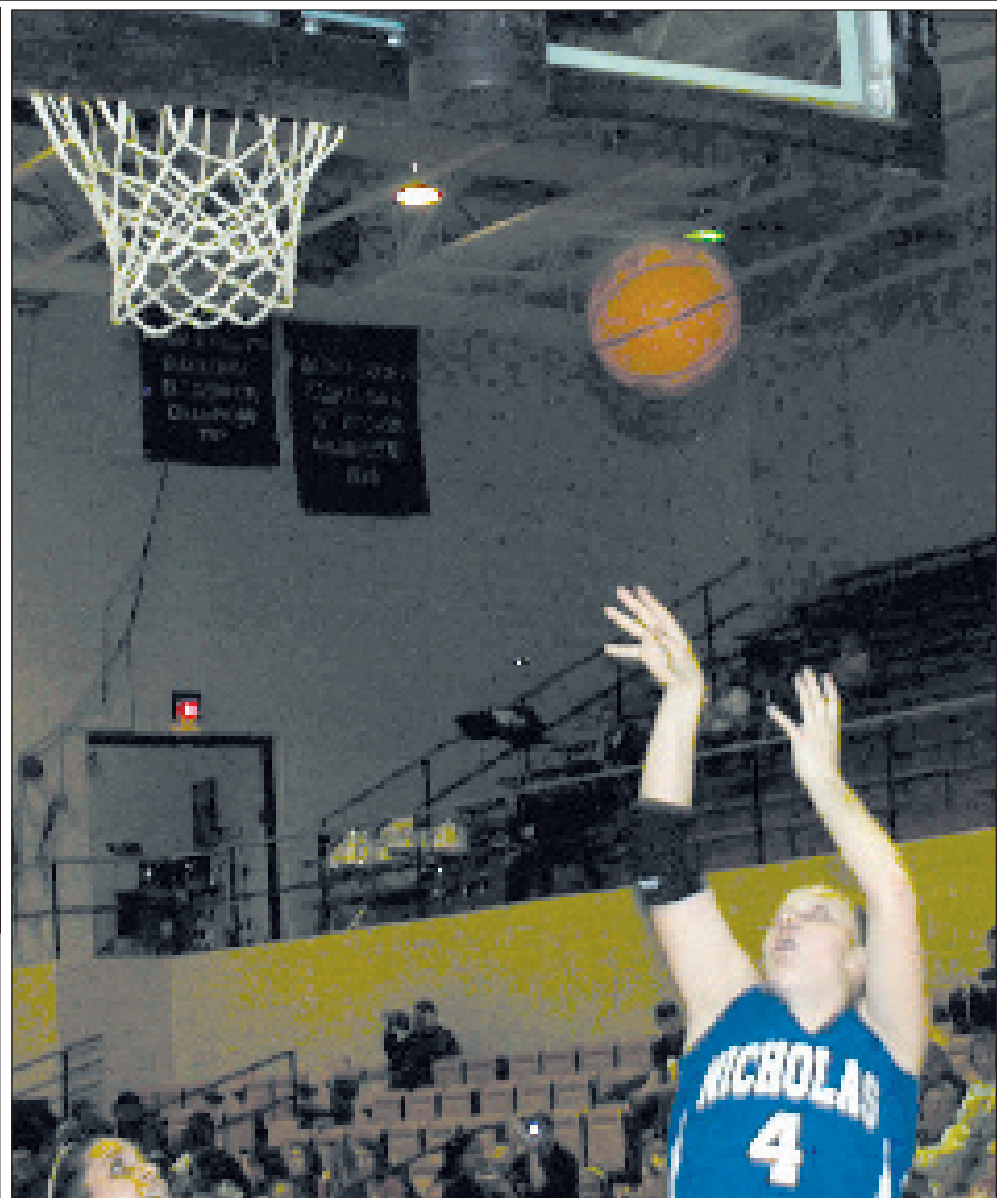

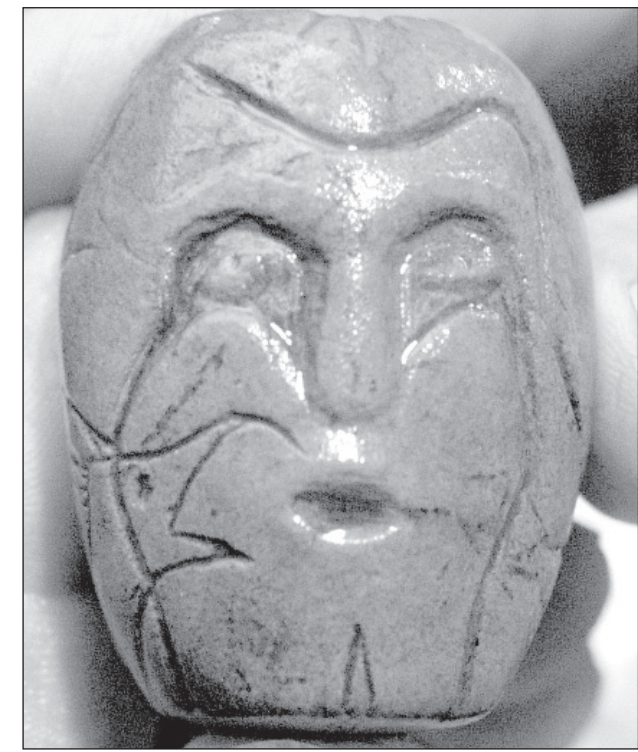

# Court adopts an alternative to jail time, discusses nuisance ordinance

On Friday, members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court approved a one-year service contract with Corisoft, a company that tracks criminal defendants.

The court meeting was the second this month. All members were present for the meeting, including Judge Executive Kenny Lyons, Magistrates Steve Hamilton, Jeff Randolph, Darvin Mitchell, Jimmy Wells, and Mike Webb. Secretary Dana Price, Treasurer Wanda Dotson, and County Attorney Dawn Letcher were also present.

Earlier in the month, during the court's Jan. 10 meeting, representatives from Corisoft gave a presentation on how their program works, using GPS tracking, cell phones, ankle bracelets, regular check-ins, and a slate of rehabilitation efforts to provide a cost-effective way to provide counties with an alternative to incarceration.

Letcher explained that Nicholas County had been part of a pilot pro-

gram to test the company's software, which currently has nine active participants. The program is slated to end on Jan. 31.

The cost to the county will be \$10 a day per participant with phone monitoring alone, or \$14 a day using ankle bracelets and phone monitoring. On average the cost for keeping people incarcerated in local jails averages around \$30 a day.

Letcher said that the program will remain under the control of the County Attorney's Office. She said that she will be monitoring expenses over the next few months to see if the program will save the county money on jail expenses.

Court members also had a lengthy discussion about adopting a public nuisance ordinance during Friday's meeting. According to a number of court members, they have received complaints over the months about junked automobiles and trash piling up in peoples' yards and driveways.

Judge Lyons said that this would be an opportunity to bring Kentucky statutes down to the

county level and to help get the trash cleaned up.

Letcher said that the county had the authority to enact such an ordinance but that it was up to county to decide how expensive they wanted the ordinance to be, in terms of fines or incarceration. She also noted that public nuisance issues could be handled as civil or criminal issues.

Letcher went on to say that enforcement should be based on neighbor's complaints rather than having law enforcement go out into the county and look for people not in compliance.

This provoked detailed discussion among court members. Magistrate Mike Webb asked if anyone could be grandfathered in with the ordinance, and Magistrates Randolph, Hamilton, and Wells, talked about fencing standards. Letcher said that with regard to fencing, it would have to be decided on a case by case basis, but currently the Solid Waste Coordinator regulates fencing standards.

"Sometimes, when it is more elastic, the better," Letcher said about fencing standards. They were on new ground now but they were lost. ing standards. Steve Hamilton said, "We as a court need to decide how we are going to handle these requests," referring to nuisance complaints.

In the end, the court agreed to take no action and rather "table" the issue for discussion at a later date.

The court did take action to name members to the newly created animal control advisory board. Court members agreed to write down names of potential citizen at large members in a secret ballot. Carol Power and Martha Sue Taylor received the largest number of votes and were accepted as at-large members.

Court members also agreed to have the members of the first board to serve staggered terms. Standard terms for members will be for 3 years.

The following people were named to the advisory board: Three-year terms: Carol Power, citizen at-large; Martha Sue Taylor, citizen at-large; and Darvin Mitchell, fiscal court member. Two-year terms: Kim van der Heiden, attorney/grant writer; Sheriff Jeff Sidles,

law enforcement. One-year terms: Dr. Walker Logan, veterinarian; and Kristi Morris, health department.

Judge Lyons said that the lease is almost up on the country club property owned by the county and that someone is currently interested in looking at it for purchase. He said that they need a week to ten days to consider the property, and if the property is not purchased, the court can agree to re-list the property for sale during the next fiscal court meeting.

Judge Lyons also reported on the road sign maintenance program. Lyons said that he and Magistrate Webb have been attending classes in order to learn about recent changes in regulations concerning road signs. Various signs around the county will need to be changed to meet new standards for reflectivity and letter size between 2015 and 2018.

Lyons said that, at the moment, a county policy needs to be approved and on file before any further changes can be made. Lyons was given a number of sample policies from

the class, and the court adopted one of them.

The next step, according to Lyons, is for the county to do an inventory of its signs and to date them.

Lyons also said that the fiscal court has to appoint someone to replace Tony Fryman on the Nicholas County Fire Board. Fryman was the fireman's representative on the Fire Board. Lyons recommended the appointment of Mike Smith, and the court approved this appointment.

Lyons also noted that Fire Board chair David Smith just got out of the hospital and that he was still having tests run.

In other actions, the court approved the County Clerk's year-end financial statement, the Quarterly Report, and the Sheriff's Financial Statement.

Court members also met in executive session with Frank McCartney to discuss pending litigation. No action was taken, and afterwards the meeting was adjourned.

The next meeting of the fiscal court is scheduled for Tuesday, February 14 at 6 p. m.

His father, Josiah, had been one of the first frontiersmen west of the Allegheny Mountains in 1766 taking lands at the base of Laurel Hill in southwestern Pennsylvania.

Most people simply called it Redstone County.

Redstone Creek drained into the Monongahela River.

From the Monongahela Country, where they had lost so many friends to raiding parties during the Revolutionary War, they had floated downstream into the confluence of the Ohio River and continued west.

They landed at Limestone Point but could not find the interior buffalo roads and so they continued downstream to the mouth of the Licking River. They then came up the Licking River, docked

their boat, divided into two groups and journeyed forth overland into the interior of Kentucky.

With over a dozen horses and twice as many cows in tow, Spencer knew there would be no sleep tonight.

That was fine with Spencer. His sleep was usually filled with nightmares and the faces of the dead children he had found following Native American raids in his old neighborhood.

They were on new ground now but they were lost.

since then in the area, indicate that Nicholas County was inhabited 1,000 years ago by men, women and children, who were very close to nature, loved to farm and enjoyed fishing and hunting.

The Clay mound, excavated by UK Professors David Funkhouser and William Webb, was approximately five feet tall and 60 feet in diameter when it was excavated almost 100 years ago.

The mound was thought to have been considerably taller but had been reduced in size from weather and cultivation.

Carlisle Chief of Police Tim "Darrell" Lane, who has roots in the Moorefield community is an avid student of ornithology—the study of birds, particularly the study of falconry and the domestication of falcons, hawks, eagles and other raptors and birds of prey, had neighbors 1,000 years ago who were as fascinated with the raptors, if not more.

Bird effigy smoking pipes as well as facial design motifs representing the forked eye emblem of the falcon are commonly found among the Native American cultures of Kentucky, especially the culture that inhabited Nicholas County 1,000 years ago.

Burial excavation of the Clay mound indicated that some men and women may have had hawks as domesticated pets with one man being buried with a head-dress, which consisted of a hawk in flight.

The culture of Native Americans whom inhabited Nicholas County 1,000 years ago are today called

the Fort Ancient Culture, so named for a community in Ohio where their significant cultural artifacts were distinguished early in archaeological studies in the nation.

Fort Ancient people occupied the area after it was previously inhabited by a distinct group of people called Adena-Hopewell.

The Adena-Hopewell first lived in Nicholas County 1,000 years before the Fort Ancient and inhabited the county and sections of Kentucky right up to the time when Fort Ancient people began living here. Before the Adena-Hopewell the area was inhabited for approximately 10,000 years by Archaic and Paleo cultures of Native American people.

The Fort Ancient people are the first people in Kentucky to have used a bow and arrow, according to archaeologists; and their flint projectile points are easily distinguished from most others as they are triangular shaped.

With these triangular shaped projectile points, or arrowheads, the Fort Ancient hunters used their stealth and skills to bag everything from white tail deer to black bear.

The Fort Ancient people used every part of the deer; the hide for clothing, the meat for nutrition, the bones for tools and they used the antlers for chisels, handles and the tips of the antler tines were hollowed out and also used for arrows.

Hunters also focused on taking wild turkeys and used special-designed calls fashioned from the wing bone of a wild turkey. There is evidence

that Fort Ancient people in Nicholas County domesticated wild turkeys.

It is known that dogs were domesticated

Fish bones and mussel shells found in Fort Ancient trash dumps lets us know that the people were avid fishermen and were knowledgeable with the Licking River, which borders Nicholas County.

Farming was well advanced 1,000 years ago with crops consisting of corn-maize, beans, pumpkins, gourds and other plants like tobacco.

People also gathered items from the woods such as ginseng, walnuts,

hickory nuts and cattails. Many sections of the cattail plant are eatable and the plant has many other uses.

While it can be said that some modern Nicholas County citizens regularly go south, even as far as Florida, to obtain goods that can be easily marketed in Kentucky and Nicholas County, this scenario also played out for the people of the county 1,000 years ago. Fort Ancient people traded in marine shells from the Gulf of Mexico and had extensive trade routes stretching all the way to Florida. Conch shells from the

ocean are still found in Nicholas County on Fort Ancient village sites.

Nicholas County fans love sports and that hasn't changed in the past 1,000 years.

Native Americans during Fort Ancient occupation played a game called Chun-Ghee, or simply "chunky" the game centered on a circular disc that was rolled by one player while other players tried to hurl a special lance or stick to a point along the path where the stone rolled.

Chunky stones are numerous on Fort ancient sites and many of the cir-

cular, polished chunky stones, made of sandstone and granite, have been found in Nicholas County.

The Fort Ancient people loved their children, tried to live comfortably while living within their means and they loved the landscape and environment of Nicholas County.

Little has changed in that regard for the citizens of Nicholas County in the last 1,000 years.

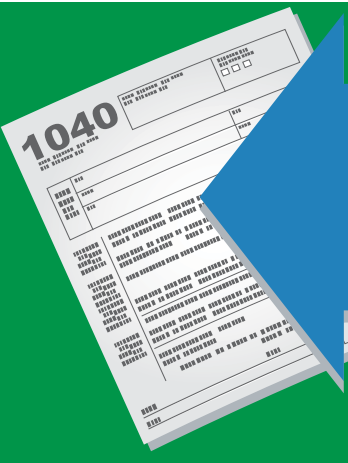
