# Save a Lot may get new building

Many residents of Carlisle and Nicholas County have been asking the same question, "When will Save a Lot be here?"

After a meeting Wednesday that answer is one step closer. According to members of the Saver Cooperation the plan is to begin a ground breaking around the middle of March with it being completed approximately 90 to 120 days later. The group has been working diligently to get the store here and opened. So far they have already completed the topography and removed the asbestos from the Jockey Building, at a cost of approximately \$103,000.


