## Two Injured in ATV Accident

The Nicholas County Emergency Medical Service was called to respond to a reported ATV accident at a private residence on Moorefield Road on Monday afternoon.

According to witnesses, two individuals, male and female in their 30s, were doing some logging work for the owner of the residence. They attempted to ascend a rather steep hill on the ATV they were operating. The ATV flipped over on top

of them, injuring them both.

Upon the arrival of the ambulances, it was immediately determined that the assistance of medical helicopters would be necessary.

The male is reported to be in stable condition. The female sustained rather serious injuries, but her current condition is unknown at this time.

"At this time, I can't release any information regarding the identities or age of the individuals" stated Nicholas County Sheriff Jeff Sidles.

## Mutual Aid Agreement Reached Between Fire Departments

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Citizens of Nicholas County have been expressing concern over the city and county fire departments, not assisting each other during a time of need. Although they have been working together in some cases, it has been a great point of contention as to the frequency of these events according to concerned citizens. While this has been an issue of great argument, it is very well known to members of the departments and citizens that a joint agreement

between them would be very helpful to our community.

After a brief review of Nicholas County Fire Chief Doug French's report and the minutes from the previous meeting, the meeting was called to order. Discussed was the possibility of a mutual aid agreement between the Carlisle City Fire Department and the Nicholas County Fire Department. This would allow both departments to work together while responding to fires that would require additional assistance. One of the most debated aspects of this agreement

by several members of the fire board was said to be the difficulty of financial responsibilities. Some members of the fire board suggested that it would be best to wait to sign the agreement until it could be reviewed and approved by the Mayor and the Judge Executive. A motion was made by Tracy Brown and seconded by Jay Morford to approve the signing of the agreement, under the provision that it attains the approval of Executive Judge Kenny Lyons and Mayor Kevin Booth. The motion carried unanimously.

Also discussed during the meeting was the recent resignation of Nicholas County Fireboard Chairman Al Warner. Due to recent health issues, Mr. Warner decided that it would in the best interest of the board to resign from his position as Chairman. There was a discussion on who would assume the duties as Chairman of the Fire Board, calling meetings, and making decisions



pertaining to the board, although Doug McCord is currently acting as Chairman and overseeing the meeting until a new one can be appointed. There were no suggestions as to who would take over the position, Mr. McCord stated that a Chairman will likely be appointed before the next meeting.

Nicholas County Fire Chief Jim Biddle also ad-

ressed the fire board. Biddle stated that he is somewhat disgruntled in regards to an event that occurred during the meeting on April 26. The meeting that resulted in a large number of firefighters resigning due to the dismissal of former Nicholas County Fire Chief Mark Hughes, caused Mr. Biddle to be placed in charge of both fire departments.

Biddle stated that this had placed him in a very difficult position. The members of the board stated that it was never their intention to place Biddle in such a position. Members of the fire board stated that they would meet with city and county officials so they could reach a mutual resolution that would allow them to work together more efficiently.

## THE SECRETS OF THE STONES



### Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

My fascination with our Native American, Kentucky ancestors motivated me to get my large self in gear over the weekend, when my Burtonville-buddy, Dorian Cook, invited me to explore a couple of potential village sites with him, that were located on the Lewis County bank of the Ohio River.

He said he had spoke with the landowners, had permission, but "we'd have to walk a little bit."

A little bit of walking for Dorian translated to a whole lot of walking for yours truly.

And no small bit of climbing up and down and along and around, the various elevations from the various heights along the river.

I couldn't imagine not taking my camera. That just doesn't happen. And add a knap sack with a little basic gear, and well, it adds up.

This whole "getting old and decrepit" thing is starting to cramp my style; and ever muscle I have. I hurt in places I didn't even know were places.

Dorian walked me into the ground. It was rough. Add to the fact that Dorian is 15 years older than me and, well, it's downright embarrassing!

But, it is what it is, and 'no pain-no gain,' cause you know how those ancient Native American artifacts are; they don't just come falling out of the sky and land at your feet like skittles from the magical rainbow. You have to get out there in the field and do a little trudging sometimes.

Native American artifact hunting has always been rewarding on a lot of different levels for me, as I hope the many wonders of the great outdoors are for all of you, dear reader. There's a timeless, adrenaline-rush that can be triggered by many things that connect us with our ancient Kentucky home; connects us with the land. There's nothing like finding a Native American artifact that hits home with me, other than, maybe, hooking a big fish.

But that's a thin 'maybe' because I love artifacts more than I love fish.

The fragmented shoreline jutted and

danced in and out at some sections of one of the sites we looked.

A small, T-shaped, Woodland-era, drill was waiting for me along the top of the rugged riverbank and although it is late in the 2012 artifact-hunting season, I feel as if I am "finally on board."

I am a novice when it comes to looking along riverbanks or smaller stream banks but I can recognize site features regardless of terrain, and when I started finding broken woodland pottery (characteristically it can be easily distinguished from Fort Ancient pottery due to the inclusion of small bits of pulverized, burnt limestone tempering, where Fort Ancient people, who came after the Woodland, used pulverized muscle shell tempering), I knew I was where I needed to be, even if I was outside of my comfort zones.

My comfort zones lie along the plowed ridges and bottoms, and within the process of stepping with the furrow while looking for arrowheads is something I've enjoyed since I was a child.

The site along the river looked to be a small fishing camp used by Native American Kentuckians of the Woodland culture about 1500 years ago.

Almost all of the flint flakes were from local resources and the occasional extinct river muscle shell led me to believe that the fishing was not always good back then. One of the camp fire areas appeared to be on the very edge of the top of the bank, so perhaps the camp was established extra close to the river during a drought?

Trying to imagine how the T-shaped drill happened to be lost along the riverbank has intrigued me. The drill

is complete, so I know it wasn't discarded due to it being broken and useless, which leads to a wide variety of other speculation. The Woodland culture expanded the practice of smoking from their "Archaic" ancestors" and the drill could possible have been used to drill the bowls and stems of pipes, constructing a shelter or any number of other uses, which it

was designed for.

Aside from the random barge that made its way along the river, the overall terrain has altered very little in the past few thousands of years, aside from the varying depths of the river. The wooded hills that lined the Ohio side looked largely the same as they did when the T-shaped drill was lost and I marveled

at the landscape as I slowly rolled that drill over and over in my hand. The secrets of the stones reveal themselves to me little by little with the passing of each year and the expanding knowledge that each year brings paints a more vivid picture of our ancient Kentucky landscape, as I continue on each year with my passion.

The City of Carlisle and Nicholas County have always taken a keen interest in providing public places for recreation.

There is plenty of space inside the city limits for the entire family to enjoy a day at the park.

East End Park, also known as the Nicholas County Recreation Park, is located on East Union Road, just off of East Main Street.

The park includes the Letcher baseball field, a basketball court, the Ron Baker tennis courts, playground, and shelter house. It also includes a bridge crossing scenic Brushy Fork Creek.

This park is where the school district used to play its baseball games, beginning in the early 1970s, and now the city of Carlisle currently rents the park from the school district for \$1 a year.

Vanlandingham Park is located at the corner of Dorsey Avenue and Spring Street, also overlooking Brushy Fork

Creek by the railroad track.

This park was dedicated in 2002 and named for City Superintendent Gayle Vanlandingham, who passed away a few years ago from cancer. This quiet little scenic tree-lined park includes a walking trail, playground, and a pavilion.

Two of the newer additions to the city park system include Jockey Park and West End Park.

Jockey Park is located across from the old Jockey Building on Concrete Road. This extensive recreation park is owned by the county and

includes Don Toy Soccer Field, Clary Fightmaster Field, and the new walking trail, which was completed earlier this year. A new football field is also under construction.

West End Park got its name from its location at the western city limits, just off of Concrete Road. The park has two baseball diamonds and includes the Live-stock Barn used by the Cooperative Extension Service and a field that has been used mostly recently for truck and tractor pulls.

The most recent addition to the city park

system is going to be the skateboard park, located across from Vanlandingham Park, also on Dorsey and Spring Streets.

Mayor Kevin Booth has worked to come up with money and a cost-effective design that will provide local skateboarders with a safe and convenient place to practice and show off their skills.

Construction is currently underway and it is expected to be completed in the near future.

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# Bluejackets open practice in preparation for 2012 season

CARLISLE - The Nicholas County High School football team returned to the gridiron Monday evening, opening practice for the 2012 season. Nicholas County, under the direction of veteran head coach Robert Hopkins, compiled a 7-5 record in 2011.

After dropping a season-opener in 2011, Nicholas County reeled off five straight wins.

Nicholas County, which advance to the second round of the 2011 Class 1A Russell Athletic/KHSAA Commonwealth Gridiron Classic, generated nearly 4,700 yards of total offense last season.

The Bluejackets scored a season-high 70 points in a convincing regular-season victory over Paintsville. Nicholas County wound up outscoring opponents 407-306.

The Bluejackets edged Allen Central 28-26 on

the road in the opening round of the postseason.

Following the opening round win over Allen Central, Nicholas County visited district foe Fairview. After falling to Fairview 0-33 less than one month earlier, Nicholas County made a strong showing. The Jackets, however, eventually fell short as Fairview claimed a hard-fought 28-14 win. With the loss, Nicholas County concluded the season 7-5.

Nicholas County must replace leading rusher Caleb Pope. The record-setting Pope rushed for 2,338 yards and 28 touchdowns on 251 carries during his senior season. Pope also caught six passes for 273 yards and three touchdowns.

Quarterback Dalton Pope is back to call signals for the Jackets. As a sophomore, Dalton Pope completed 48-of-130 passes for 985 yards and

11 touchdowns during the 2011 season.

Austin Allison, Nicholas County's second-leading rusher from last season, does return. Allison rushed for 561 yards and six touchdowns on 75 attempts during his junior campaign.

Leading receiver Zack Howard is also set to perform in his senior season. As a junior, Howard reeled in 18 catches for 285 yards and three touchdowns.

Allison followed with 15 catches for 274 yards and a team-high four touchdowns.

Nicholas County is scheduled to practice throughout the week.

The Jackets will open the 2012 season on Aug. 17 at Mount Sterling in the Montgomery County Rec Bowl versus Lewis County. Kickoff for the Nicholas County-Lewis County game is set for 7:30 p.m.

# Ted: Not For the Easily Offended

The story of a man and his teddy bear.

When I first heard the premise of Seth Macfarlane's first theatrical film, I greeted it with an unenthusiastic roll of the eyes. Then I heard it was an R-rated comedy. It still didn't persuade me. I was once a fan of Macfarlane's animated television shows (Family Guy, American Dad and The Cleveland Show) but I'm not sure if I grew tired of the shows' self-referential humor, or I outgrew the raunchy low-brow and self-deprecating jokes. I will admit I was skeptical of this film idea. Not until I heard the talk surrounding the film did I finally give in and see it.

Ted's plot is little more than the leading sentence of this article states. Mark Wahlberg portrays John Bennett, a man whose only childhood friend was a magically anthropomorphic stuffed teddy bear (voiced by Macfarlane himself.) This friendship made its way into John's adulthood, and became a huge part of his life. Ted is forever a companion to John, until Lori (Mila Kunis) gives John an ultimatum to choose Ted or her. Unable to part with his only childhood friend, or the love of his life, John is forced to balance his life between his best friend and his girlfriend.

Seth Macfarlane's directorial debut is full to brim with his trademark humor, sparing no expense at mock-



ing social issues and the celebrity lifestyle. Those viewers who are familiar with his show Family Guy will find it highly enjoyable finding the cameos from the show. Although it can be difficult matching faces to voices, die-hard fans should have no difficulty.

Ted is not without its heart though. While the bromance vs. romance premise is highly familiar, the bond formed between the characters is very convincing, even when one of the main three characters is a computer generated teddy bear. This film is highly enjoyable and sure to please fans of Family Guy and Seth Macfarlane's other work. A minor warning, this film is NOT for children. It's brand of stoner and sexual humor may be deemed inappropriate by some, and it's social commentary would likely fly over the young ones' heads. 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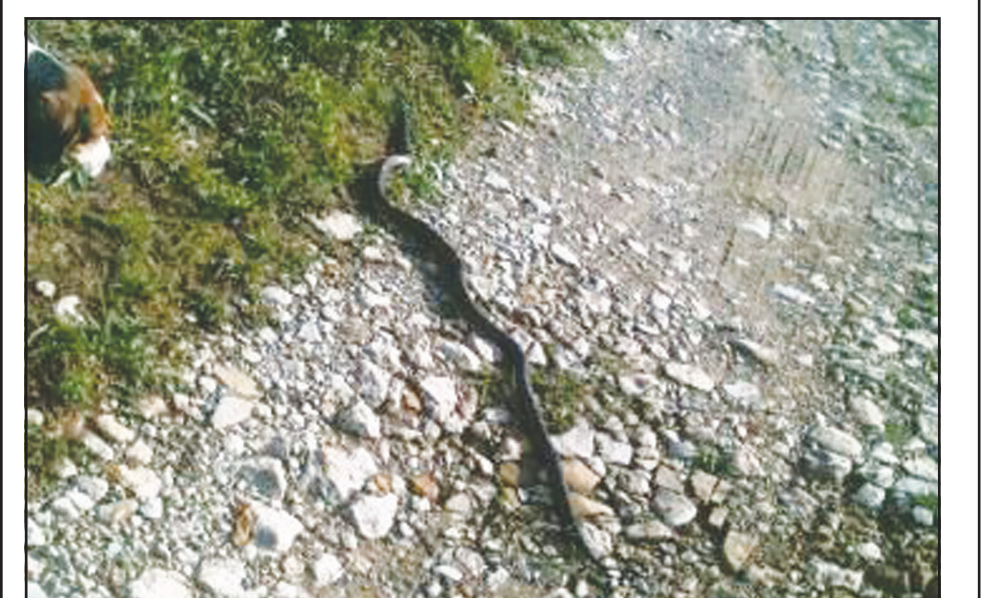

It is no secret that there are some roads in our area that are in dire need of repair. Some continue to be in a dilapidated state, making them extremely difficult to navigate. This is not only a concern of the appearance of surrounding communities; it is also a major safety concern.

This issue was the central point of the recent meeting of the Robertson County Planning Commission. The meeting took place last Thursday at the Robertson County Community Center.

The planning commission was formed in 2010 through a joint agreement between the City of Mt. Olivet and the Robertson County Fiscal Court. Since the creation of the Commission, some of their main accomplishments include a comprehensive plan for Robertson County and the adoption of cell tower regulations. The commission meets every second Thursday of every month to discuss issues and conflicts plaguing the community.

The main discussion at the meeting centered on the maintenance and repair of Kentucky Route 165, which runs through the small community of Mt. Olivet and runs into Highway 68. Many people enjoy traveling this road to the beautiful scenery that surrounds the small town. They stated that their main mission was to contact the road department about the possibility of repair, due to the road being the primary means of some of the citizens of Mt. Olivet getting to their jobs.

The members of the Planning Commission also stated the need of

Olivet that serves fine dining and wine. It is believed that this will attract the largest amount of visitors.

The improvement of the green space around town was considered a possibility. Two

people from Mt. Olivet have recently completed a 15-week Master Gardener course at Mt. Olivet. The commission expects to meet with Tracy Peramin, the local Horticulture Specialist, in regards to this idea.

They mentioned that there were many accidents located at the intersection, seeing as that it is located at the bottom of a rather large hill. Chairperson Sue Connely also stated that it is very easy to miss the entrance to the road, which is the primary entrance to the community of Mt. Olivet.

Aside from discussions regarding road conditions, the Planning Commission also discussed possible ways to improve the community. Some of these ideas included:

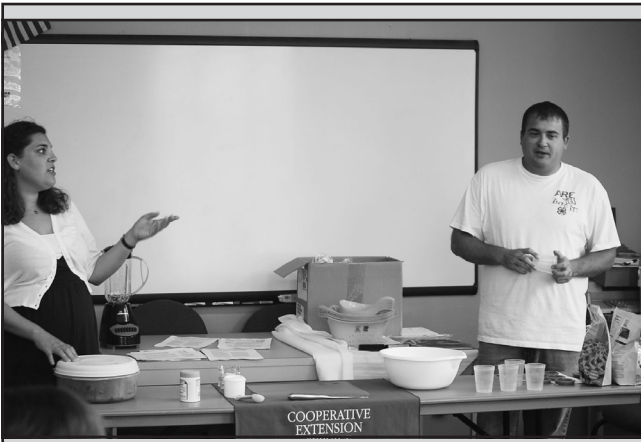

The City of Carlisle has a new park. The newly dedicated park is located along Spring Street in Dorseyville. In an emotional Tuesday morning ceremony at the park site, the Carlisle City Council unanimously passed City Ordinance No. 6-2002, declaring the property on the north side of Spring Street to be dedicated as "Vanlandingham Park." The name is in honor of City Superintendent Jimmy Gale Vanlandingham for his 35 years of public works service to the City of Carlisle.

The Carlisle City Council held its regular monthly meeting last Wednesday night July 10 (after the weekly deadline for The Nicholas Countian). All members of the council were present, along with a crown of supporters for

an ordinance to permit a drive-up window at the new Soper Family Pharmacy at the corner of Broadway and Market Street.

The Nicholas County Board of Education held its regular monthly meeting Monday night (July 15). The major topic on the table was faculty staffing for the 2002-2003 school year that begins next month. Hiring certified special education teachers is a major concern, not just in Nicholas County but across Kentucky and the nation.

Nicholas County Hospital will have the ability to offer approximately 55 new nursing home beds this fall. Nicholas County Magistrates unanimously agreed at Tuesday's regular meeting to authorize a \$700,000 bond issue for

a renovation project. A new director of the Nicholas County Senior Citizens Center has been selected leaving other center employees unsure of their hours. Angela Bowles was unanimously selected by the Nicholas County Fiscal Court to fill the spot left vacated by Shirley Vice, who steps down after 18 years of service.

There will be "room for a raise" for city employees if a new ordinance survives a second reading at the next meeting of city council. So far, the prospect looks good with council members Doug Garrett, Sharon Faulconer, Libby Earlywine, Frankie Hughes, Sandra Ritchie and Tommy Vaughn unanimously approving a new pay scale for city employees as recommended by Mayor Ronnie Clark.

**1992**  
Clay Campbell of Phelps High School and Franklin Smith from Tug Valley High School in West Virginia, hired by Superintendent Ceibert Gilbert Monday night as head and assistant coach of the Nicholas County Bluejackets, resigned their posts early Tuesday morning. They were employed for about 11 hours.

Carlisle Mayor Frankie Hughes told members of the Nicholas County Water District that they would receive no more water supplies from the city reservoir until they meet their obligation to supply water to Jim Simons.

Two weeks before the end of July, five members of the Carlisle Baptist Church embarked on a two week mission to Brazil. On July 1 they returned. They were

there to build a church. But their experience according to Kevin Thomas, pastor of the Carlisle Baptist Church, in an impoverished village on the outskirts of Victoria, Brazil was more deeply moving than any one of them ever expected.

**1987**  
A motion made by Magistrate Orville Atkinson to create a county extension district board for Nicholas County failed to get a second at the July 8 meeting of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court. Jim Caswell, a local farmer and spokesman for a group of concerned homemakers, farmers and county extension employees, and Bob Herbst, area extension director for University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, had proposed the plan at the June 17 meeting of fiscal court to elect

the board, which would be responsible for setting a tax rate to raise funds for operation of the county extension office.

Nicholas County Elementary students will benefit greatly from new computers. The \$16,923 purchase was approved by the Nicholas County Board of Education meeting, July 13. The new IBM Personal System II computers, six in total including software, will be used by lower level elementary students in the system's writing to read program.

City residents will not see a raise in taxes this year, at least from city government. Carlisle City Council members voted Monday night at its regular meeting to leave the city tax rate the same as last year, which is 23 cents per \$100 evaluation.

## Thoughts from the Pastors Study

"Live for Jesus"

I Love the way Jesus teaches in parables. A parable requires the participation by the listener. Jesus teaches in parables to involve each individual listener so that each person has to place themselves in the situation therefore finding the meaning and the lesson specific to each person. We become part of the action. A parable is active and alive because Jesus is active, and alive. If understanding a parable is difficult then chances are it has a specific message for you to struggle with and understand what Jesus is trying to tell you. So rejoice in seeking the meaning of each parable because that's the point.

When we talk about living our lives for Jesus the parable that I like to use and that means a lot to me is the parable of the sower of seeds. In this parable the seeds are the word of God. The crop is the kingdom of heaven. Each situation mentioned in the parable reflects a situation in our everyday lives. Seeds that are thrown upon rocky hard soil just lay on top and are never sowed in and the birds can come and pick them or they can be swept away and no crop is ever yielded. Much like a person who hears the word of God frequently yet never

lets that word soak into their soul and Satan sweeps it away and they never yield the fruits of heaven. Some seed

is sown on thorny soil. These people hear the word of God and they sharply resistant. They not only ignore it they interfere with the seeds, the word of God, becoming fruitful. Then there's the good soil were the seeds are accepted by the soil, they are given root and take hold of the soul and through wind and adverse conditions hang in there and grow and are fruitful. These people, this good soil, work their soil and till and weed and nurture the seed, the word of God, and as the parable says yield to 100 times what was sown. This is how we live our life for Jesus. We have to hear the word, accept the word, and through our deeds and actions cultivate the word of God. And just like a good gardener that tends their garden and does the work required, in this case the work of the church, you will yield a bumper crop. And when you do this within your church family and each person harvests what God has given you can share what you have made fruitful with others. It's just like you give someone a tomato they give you some corn, you give them some beans and they'll give you some cucumbers and so on. But the idea is when you live your life for Jesus you will as a result be living your life for others and sharing your crop so that everyone has a variety and plenty of it. And since the yield will be 100 times what is sown we can share and spread God's word with everyone.

Understand that living your life for Jesus does not mean you can't have a life of your own. On the contrary your life will be so enhanced and enriched that your faith and your doing the work that God wills you to do will yield huge dividends 100 times what you sow. And to do this we must take every mundane aspect of our daily life and do it as a daily sacrifice to the glory of God. Go to church. Hear the word of God. Sow the seed into your soul. Let that seed take root inside you. God will give you a job to do, do it. This will nurture the seed and it will grow and the kingdom of God will be within you. Live your life for Jesus and the crop you yield will be sweeter than any fruit, healthier than any vegetable, and more beautiful than any flower that you could ever grow, and your life will be better and more wonderful than you could ever have on your own without Jesus. Again I say go to church, enhance who you are, make yourself better by doing the work of God, don't let the word of God lay on top of the soil to be swept away. Remove the thorns in your life that are keeping the seed from taking root. Prepare your soil and accept God's word then harvest and share the fruits of the kingdom of heaven with everyone around you every day in everything you do and we will all have plenty. God bless you all, and I'll see you in church, cause we've got some work to do, some seed to sow, some soil to tend, and some love to harvest.

## Grass Fire at Eagle Valley

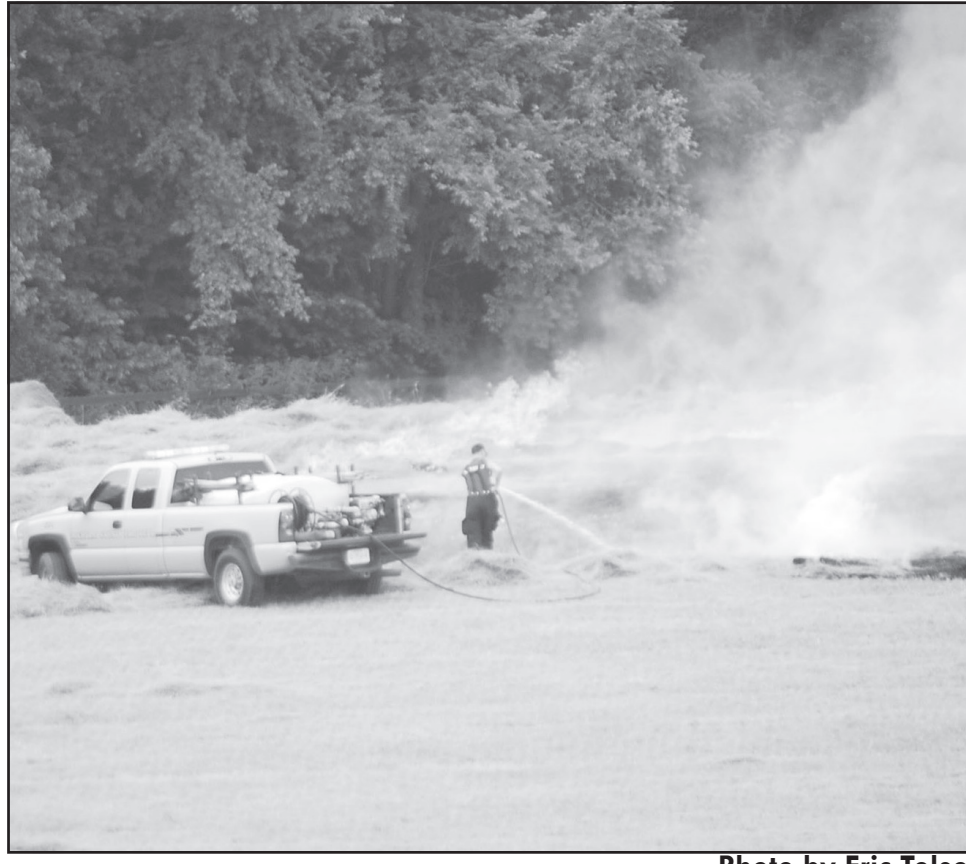

Nicholas County is the best run county in Kentucky. No? You don't think so? Lets look at that.

Although times are hard, the county could use funds much better.

The Court can build roads, because the state gives them a million dollars a year paid by our gasoline taxes. Almost all other county departments are currently underfunded.

The dump loses over \$60,000 a year. A person, who uses the dump spends 1 dollar a bag. Three bags per week averages about \$36 per quarter. Persons using home pickup pay about \$49 per quarter. People who pay for home pickup also pay taxes which support the dump. Our court is willing to take a \$60,000 loss, rather than close the dump or increase prices.

The county pays \$12,000.00 a year for emergency dispatch. The phone company has a 911 charge on your phone bill. That money can be reimbursed, if a request is submitted by the City of Carlisle. That money could be returned to the county.

The money saved from the dump and dispatch could be used to fund other vital county services, that now are not funded or underfunded.

If there is a special project that people wish to support, a special tax can be levied. If people want a particular project they must be willing to pay for it. The rainy day fund is now a fraction of what it was. The budget has been balanced from the rainy day fund for years so, if there is an emergency, there isn't much money available.

Your fiscal court magistrates report to no one. The Judge executive is considered head of the county, but in reality he has only one vote in six. He presents proposals to the court, but casts a deciding vote only in a tie. Your magistrates run the county. Every voter in Nicholas County needs to care what programs the county funds. The citizens of Nicholas County need to demand accountability and responsibility from their magistrates. The Fiscal Court meets the 2nd Tuesday of the month in the conference room at the courthouse. Every citizen is welcome.

Throughout our County people complain about government, but if they want to change it, they must hold their magistrates accountable.

**Commissioner verses Magistrates**

The first this change in government will save the County \$27,063.22. The average annual salary of a magistrate is \$13,531.61 which includes health insurance. Additionally if a

magistrate serves for 10 years and retires, the county pays 50% of their health insurance, 15 years 75% and 20 years full coverage and retirement benefits for the rest of their lives. All paid by Nicholas County tax payers.

If the measure to change to commissioners, is approved by the voters, the Judge Executive would divide the county into three districts. In the general election the entire county would vote for the commissioners. There are Kentucky counties with populations of more than 100,000 people, which function well with three commissioners.

Nicholas County receives \$1,045,089.00 from the state of Kentucky as its share of gasoline tax. This money is known in the county as the road fund. The state requires road fund money to be spent only on roads, equipment, gasoline and those employees solely working on roads. Consequently decisions on building, clearing and repairing roads are easy compared to decisions on how to fund education, senior citizens, animal control, soil conservation, hospitals and public safety.

With the exception of maintaining roads, this year Nicholas County must fund every other public service from \$1,125,911.00 received from property taxes. Public Safety costs are \$267,961.00. This does not include costs of the County Attorney \$15,874.00. Every person arrested and incarcerated by the Carlisle Police or the Sheriff is paid for by the county. It costs \$30 a day for Nicholas County to house a prisoner in Bourbon

County. Cost of maintaining the courthouse is \$94,000.00 Ambulance services and dispatch costs \$115,085.00. These costs alone are about a half a million dollars.

The entire budge for parks is \$5500. Most citizens believe young people need activities in the county, but there is not additional money in the budget and there will never be unless an additional funding source is found. Senior citizens receive \$28,000.00 and as the county ages they will not receive additional funding. By changing from five magistrates to three commissioners the senior citizens budget item could be almost fully funded.

The petition circulating around the county to change the Fiscal Court from five magistrates to three commissioners asks only that you sign to allow the question to be placed on the ballot so the people of the county can hear the pros and cons before the November election and make an informed decision.

# COMMISSIONER COMER URGES LIVESTOCK AND GRAIN PRODUCERS TO TAKE PRECAUTIONS

Agriculture Commissioner James Comer expressed grave concerns for Kentucky's livestock producers and corn producers and cautioned them to take steps to protect themselves from potential losses. Comer said that drought-stricken corn silage could contain toxic levels of nitrogen. If fed to livestock, this corn silage could be fatal.

"I am not going to sugarcoat the severity of this situation," said Commissioner Comer, who raises beef cattle on his farm in Monroe County. "I am very

concerned for all our producers and their families."

The Kentucky field office of the National Agricultural Statistics Service reported that, as of Sunday, 72 percent of Kentucky's corn crop and 76 percent of the Commonwealth's pastures were rated poor or very poor. Commissioner Comer said some corn stalks aren't producing ears, which has led many growers, especially those in western Kentucky, to consider chopping their corn into silage to salvage some value.

"Feeding silage can

help livestock producers who need to feed their animals because their pastures are suffering from the dry weather," Commissioner Comer said. "But producers should be careful about feeding corn silage until they have determined that the nitrogen content is at an acceptable level."

The University of Kentucky Agricultural Weather Center stated Monday that western Kentucky and the bluegrass region are in extreme hydrological drought while central and eastern Kentucky are in severe drought.

Western Kentucky would need more than 16 inches of rain to end the drought, according to UK. Because it does not appear that this drought will abate anytime soon, Commissioner Comer urged farmers who have federal crop insurance to check in with their adjusters before making any major decisions.

Commissioner Comer has communicated with the governor's office regarding the possibility of a declaration of emergency in counties across the Commonwealth.

I was at our summer convention in Louisville this past week and as I was talking to other Judges and Magistrates from across the state some of the counties have already lost much of their corn crop, second cutting of hay and water supplies are getting dangerously low. This will no doubt affect the cattle market in the near future.

Adam Tubbs, with the Extension Office has been researching the history of the flag on top of our courthouse along with Melissa Mitchell of The Carlisle Mercury. Melissa ran a good article in last week's paper about the flag. I had been told that we had the last operating flag of this kind in the U.S. During Adams research he found another one in Saline County, Missouri. Theirs had been taken down and stored for several years before they decided to restore it. In discussion with the county officials from Saline County, it was brought up about doing a resolution between Nicholas County and Saline County naming us Sister Counties which our court approved at our last court meeting. If you haven't seen the article on our flag I would encourage everyone to get a copy. Nicholas County is very rich in history and I would like to see more of it preserved for future generations.

One of the things that I noticed in the pictures of the courthouse was the iron railing that was on top of the flat part of the roof. I was wondering if anyone knows when this was taken down and where it is today. If anyone knows please let me know.

In the meetings this past week with other county and state officials the thing I noticed most was that the counties that were growing the most was counties with Economic Development Directors. Although hiring a director can be expensive up front they can be worth their weight in gold if we get a good one. An economic development director is in constant touch with the state economic development office and is able to stay on top of anyone who is trying to relocate a business to our state. The director's job has to be a full time position and must have the contacts and the knowledge to handle the position professionally. I don't know of anyone who is going to walk up and hand us anything. We must be willing to make some sacrifices if we want to move forward. If we want to stay where we are or possibly lose ground with the surrounding area then all we have to do is nothing and this will happen. Change is a hard pill to swallow at times but if we want to survive and make this county better for the future then we cannot sit still. If we decide to move forward it is going to have to be a team effort. If not please let me know and I will quit trying to push change.

One thing I am going to push is getting Maysville Community College in Carlisle. Our Industrial Authority is on board with this as it ties in with what they are trying to do by developing a better educated work force. We are already trying to sign up people for the fall classes and hope to have the old Jockey Sewing Plant ready to house the classes sometime this fall.

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# Court purchases backhoe for County Road Department

Members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court opened up their July 10 meeting with bid proposals for a backhoe that is needed for the County Road Department. The court received two bid proposals for a backhoe, the first bid was from Derrick Livingood with a 310D John Deere 95 model, 4500 hours 2WD, full cab with heat, two stick control shift, front and rear bucket, and a operating manual asking \$21,500.00. Derrick Livingood was present at the Fiscal court meeting and stated that the backhoe was a "nice machine but was not a 4 wheel drive. He just didn't use it anymore"

Randolph Truck Sales 2006 580 Super M Case 4x4 cab with heating and air, 3500 hours, good tires with a price of \$34,900.00. A couple of the other quotes that Magistrate Mike Webb and Steve Hamilton had were for a new 580SN that was \$65,982.00.

Judge Lyons asked Road Foreman Mike Watkins if the road department needed a 4WD or a 2WD?

Watkins stated that the department really needed to have a 4WD.

A motion was made to purchase the 580 SN from Randolph Sales for \$34,900.00 by Mike Webb, seconded by Darwin Mitchell, all approved with Jeff Randolph abstaining (not participating in) the vote.

Nicholas County Emergency Management director Calvin Denton addressed the court.

"I would like to apply for digital radios for the city and county trucks the grant would be in the amount of approximately \$26,000 to \$28,000," Denton said. In order to apply he needed a resolution from the court and from the Blue Grass Area Development District (BGADD), in order to apply for this grant. The county would be purchasing about 13 radios.

Magistrate Randolph asked if this grant would help get radios for the county road department and Denton replied that it was for only fire, ambulance and police. They both were in agreement that the county road departments are important for the emergencies that are declared that requires the help of the road departments.

A motion to approve the resolution was made by Randolph seconded by Magistrate Jimmy Wells. All approved the resolution.

The BGADD charges 2.5 % recovery to purchase price to write the grant, this is pretty common for writing grants. A motion was made to enter into a professional agreement with BGADD for the purpose of the application for the 2012 Homeland Security grant of the cost of 2.5% of the grant award by Jimmy Wells, with a second by Mike Webb and all approved.

Setting up an account in the general fund for Payroll solutions was discussed.

"How is the payroll Solutions working out?" asked Magistrate Randolph

County Secretary Dana Price and Nicholas County Treasurer Wanda Dotson said

it seems to be working pretty good though there are still have a few things that they need to work on but both believed it was a good system.

A motion was made by Webb to set up an account in the general fund for the payroll solutions seconded by Mitchell, all approved.

In the old business, the court discussed the progress of the football field at the Jockey Park. The field is close to being complete. Nicholas County Judge-Executive Kenny Lyons and Magistrate Mitchell stated that they had noticed several citizens using the walking trail, and would encourage everyone to go out and enjoy it.

Some new business was brought before the court; Adam Tubbs has been researching some history on the electric flag that is placed at the dome of the courthouse. While some thought that the flag was the only electric flag Tubbs was able to locate another state that held a smaller electric flag, Saline County, Missouri.

Saline County, Missouri to the best of our knowledge is the only other place an electric flag still remains.

"A nice article appeared in The Carlisle Mercury in regards to the electric flag", Judge Lyons said.

"Saline County, Missouri would like for us to sign a proclamation recognizing the two counties as sister counties."

A motion was made by Wells, seconded by Mitchell, with all approving to sign the proclamation, which states that Nicholas County, Kentucky and Saline County, Mis-

souri, are sister counties and share a historical connection with the electric flag.

Discussion of the Maysville Community College starting up at the Industrial Building will not be costing the county anything. The Industrial Park will be fixing the walls and that their expense. According to Dr. Robert Sparks, credit hours are \$140.00. by going to Maysville Community College credit hours are \$70.00. Dr. Sparks was wondering if this could be something that the Mathers Fund could assist with. This is a matter that will have to be brought before the Mathers Fund committee. County Attorney Dawn Letcher is checking into this matter for the court. The Fiscal Court is hoping that the cost of the utility bills possibly could be split 50/50 between the county and the city for the building to be able to host the Maysville Community College.

Senior Citizen director Shauna Hatton, Andrea Watkins and Judge Lyons, traveled to Frankfort to meet with Bluegrass CAP. Bluegrass CAP recommended that some cuts to be done. Judge Lyons spoke with both Hatton and Watkins in regards to the issues at the Senior County Center. The two came up with a plan to be able to get the center back to proper operating procedures. The Center received two large cuts in funding from the state that administers were not expecting.

Judge Lyons asked the court to give them an extra six months for a probation period to be able to get things back on track.

Magistrate Webb stated that Hatton and Watkins were working hard to move the center forward.

"They realize the mistakes that we made on last year's budget and I as a board member allowed it to happen too, I feel that the girls have learned from their mistakes. I think that with the raises that the Senior Citizen Center received from the Fiscal Court and the City and with getting the \$8,000 back from the bid of Home Care, they will be able to keep the boat sailing. So I recommend that we at least give them a year and then look at it again and go from there."

Hatton stated that they were not expecting to get the cuts of \$9,000 and then another \$10,000. Since their meeting with Judge Lyons on Friday they said they had made some money-saving changes.

A motion was made by Webb, seconded by Wells and unanimously approved to continue the current operation of the Nicholas County Senior Citizen Center to be managed locally on probation of one year.

Hatton and Watkins thanked the court for their help.

Judge Lyons spoke with Senator R. J. Palmer and Transportation Cabinet Official

Bart Bryant about the approval from Frankfort on the roads for Lakeshore and Hickory Ridge. Hinkle contracting recommended milling the old road before blacktopping the roads.

Magistrate Steve Hamilton stated that he had a road slide that needed to be fixed, Mitchell also stated that he had several road slips that needed to be fixed as well.

Judge Lyons asked that the magistrates turn in roads that needed repair; some of the roads that were mentioned were Rocky Top, Dixie Highway, Hickory Ridge, Walnut Grove, Law Estate, Concord, Stoney Creek, Morning Glory, Veale Lane. These are some of the roads that the magistrates wanted to send to the state to have the roads fixed with the flex money that they have for the roads.

County Attorney Dawn Letcher is drafting a Mutual Aid Agreement for the County and the City to sign for the Fire departments to be able to respond if the fire chiefs requested help. A motion was made to approve the agreement by Hamilton seconded by Jimmy, all approved.

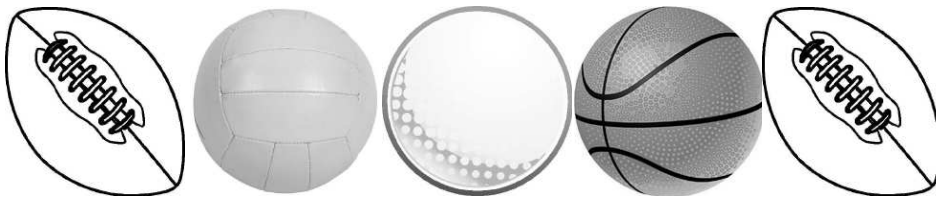
