Carnico Country Club building to be placed on auction block

The Carnico Country Club building is going up for auction.

That was the decision made by the Nicholas County Fiscal Court last Friday morning during a special called meeting. Judge Kenny Lyons, with all magistrates present – Steve Hamilton, Jeff Randolph, Darvin Mitchell, Mike Webb, and Jimmy Wells – agreed that it was

The building is currently leased by Triple C Carlisle and Hatton Builders.

The magistrates finally agreed to sell the building at absolute auction after some discussion of how to deal with the building's contents. Magistrates agreed to have a realtor do an inventory of the property and advise the court on how best to sell it.

The other item on Friday's special called meeting was a request for permission for Judge Lyons to apply for grants

Development District. Lyons is seeking funds

from Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) and the Appalachian Regional Commission to construct a combined county and city fire department building.

The proposed building project would also contain a community room for use for training and other public events.

The CDBG grant would cover 80%, and the ARC grant would cover the other 20%, while the county would have to cover the cost of

Lyons noted that the

City of Carlisle could not apply for a grant for the proposed project since it had just been approved for a grant to improve its water and sewer system.

Emergency Management Director Calvin Denton said that both the county and city fire department buildings are in dire need of repairs.

Denton also said that there is an advantage to having the fire department building located in town because so many of the fire fighters work

and live close by.

Lyons said that he had not spoken with either of the fire departments or the County Fire Board about this issue. However he did say that he would speak with both departments and find out what they need in a building.

Magistrate Steve Hamilton asked how big a combined structure would be, and Denton said that it would have to contain at least six bays.

While there has been

some talk around the county about combining the city and county fire departments, Judge Lyons was quick to add that this proposed project was not an endorsement of consolidating the departments.

Judge Lyons also told the magistrates that the county could turn down the grant if the project did not work out.

Magistrates voted unanimously to give Judge Lyons permission to apply for the grants.



tion, Adams said that the driver, George A.

Watkins, 42, Carlisle, smelled of alcohol. When asked if he had been drinking, Watkins said that he had two beers.

Officer Adams asked Watkins to step out of the vehicle, and he stumbled and had to hold on to the vehicle. Adams noted that Watkins had three indications of intoxication on a gaze test, and he did not administer other field sobriety tests because of his condition.

Watkins' breathalyzer test showed a .229. The legal limit is .08.

A search of the car revealed a marijuana cigarette in the ashtray, hemostats in the console, and an ink pen containing white powder that had been

used as a snort tube. Watkins was arrested and charged with driving on a DUI suspended license, 1st offense; no registration receipt; possession of drug paraphernalia; operating a motor vehicle under the influence; and possession of an open alcohol con-

tainer in a vehicle. Watkins was lodged in the Bourbon County Detention Center. He was released the following day. No bond information was available at the time the

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





Norton Cancer Institute to host donation event for Susan G. Komen for the Cure Tissue Bank at IU Simon Cancer Center

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (May 22, 2012) - For thefirst time, the Susan G. Komen for the Cure Tissue Bank at IU Simon Cancer Center is holding a tissue donation event outside of Indiana. Norton Cancer Institute in Louisville, Ky., has partnered with the tissue bank to host a donation event on Saturday, June 9, 2012.

According to Susan G. Komen for the Cure, it is estimated that close to 230,000 new cases of invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed in the United States in 2012. Scientists researching breast cancer have discovered that understanding abnormal breast tissue is hindered by the lack of knowledge about what is normal. The Komen tissue bank was created in response to scientists' need for healthy breast tissue to compare with cancerous tissue, allowing them to determine the differences that ultimately will lead to a better understanding of the

Healthy women in the Louisville area are encouraged to contribute to breast cancer re-

search by donating a breast tissue sample to the Komen tissue bank during the event at Norton Cancer Institute -Downtown. During the donation process, local anesthesia is applied and a tissue sample is taken from one breast. The amount of tissue collected is about one gram (the size of two peas). Donors also will have the opportunity to tour the first floor of Norton Cancer Institute's beautiful new facility on the corner of Floyd Street and Broadway. To participate, women

This event is a chance for women to help accelerate the research into the causes and prevention of breast cancer," Dr. Berry said.

The Komen tissue bank, which is housed at the Indiana University Melvin and Bren Simon Cancer Center in Indianapolis, is the first and only known bank for healthy breast tissue in the world. To date, more than 2,650 women have contributed breast tissue samples. The collection at Norton Cancer Institute will allow Louisville residents to take part in the search for the cure. 

All of us have seen documentaries. Whether we intended to or not, we all are somehow influenced by the material presented to us. Watching documentaries, we have come to expect what is in store when begin viewing. They educate us. Those individuals who wish to learn about a particular subject will seek them out. They are, by nature, informative and often encourage one to take up a cause or a charity. Very rarely has anyone created a documentary that has been particularly different or

out of the norm.

Exit Through the Gift Shop, a 2010 documentary directed by famed street artist Banksy. The film tells the story of Thierry Guetta, a proprietor of a clothing store turned aspiring filmmaker. The film first displays Guetta's obsession with filmmaking, filming everything he sees and rarely seen without a camera. Guetta seems to film anything without direction and does nothing with his thousands of hours of footage. That is until he stumbles upon a street artist creating graffiti on a building in Los Angeles. Guetta develops an obsession with street art, eventually meeting legendary street artist Banksy in Europe. After filming for several years, Guetta eventually shows edits his staggering amount of footage into a 90-minute documentary titled Life Re-

mote Control. After see-

ing the footage, Banksy

deemed the documen-

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tary "unwatchable", citing the lightning quick editing techniques to resembling "a 90-minute movie trailer." He tells Guetta that his film could use some improvement, volunteering his assistance. But first, he has to get him out of the

"Why don't you go make some art?"

This is the phrase that singles out Exit Through the Gift Shop from any other documentary. At this point, the subject becomes the documentarian, turning the camera around 180 degrees. The film then follows Guetta mortgaging his business to fund the purchase of an art studio and a full staff of young artists. Guetta then uses his resources to create an extravagantly large amount of art, containing a mixture of pop art and street art, among others. During the setup of the art show, Banksy, who face is hidden and his voice distorted to protect his anonymity as a street artist, is interviewed, stating that

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BREAD OF LIFE

If a son asks for bread from any father among you, will he give him a stone? -Luke 11:11

The following question arises: Are salvation and healing for all? They are for all who will press right in and claim their portion. Do you remember the case of that Syro-Phoenician woman who wanted the demon cast out of her daughter? Jesus said to her, "Let the children be filled first, for it is not good to take the children's bread and throw it to the little dogs" (Mark 7:27). Note that healing and deliverance are here spoken of by the Master as "the children's bread"; therefore, if you are a child of God, you can surely press in your portion. The Syro-Phoenician woman purposed to get from the Lord what she was after, and she said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the little dogs under the table eat from the children's crubms" (v. 28). Jesus was stirred as He saw the faith of this woman, and He told her, "For this saying go your way; the demon has gone out of your daughter". The World can drive every disease away from your body. Healing is your portion in Christ, who Himself is our bread, our life, our health, our all in all. Though you may be deep in sin, you can come to Him in repentance, and He will forgive and cleanse and heal you. His words are spirit and life to those who will re-

ceive them (John 6:63).

There is a promise in the last verse of Joel that says, "I will cleanse their blood that I have not cleansed", (Joel 3:21 KJV). This essentially says that He will provide new life within. The life of Jesus Christ, God's Son, can so purify people's hearts and minds that they become entirely transformed—spirit, soul, and body. The sick people were around the pool of Bethesda, and one particular man had been there a long time. His infirmity was of thirty-eight years standing. Now and again an opportunity to be healed would come as the angel stirred the waters, but he would be sick at heart as he saw another step in and be healed before him. Then one day Jesus was passing that way, and seeing him lying there in that sad condition, He asked, "Do you want to be made well?" (John 5:6). Jesus said it, and His words are "from everlasting to everlasting" (Ps 90:2). These are His words today to you, tried and tested one. You may say, like this poor sick man, "I have missed every opportunity until now." Never mind that. "Do you want to be made

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Commonwealth celebrates historic role in War of 1812 Bicentennial

This month marks the 200th anniversary of the declaration of the War of 1812, fought between the United States and Great Britain.

The war is now mostly overlooked in American history, but at the time, it was regarded as "the Second American Revolution" with the defeat of the British in 1814.

The war also trained a generation of heroes and political leaders, including Presidents Andrew Jackson, William Henry Harrison, and Zachary Taylor and Vice President Richard Johnson.

The American effort also inspired Francis Scott Key to write "The Star Spangled Banner" in 1814.

The Kentucky Historical Commission is using this year to raise awareness of the enormous contributions the Commonwealth of Kentucky made to the war effort.

About 25,000 Kentuckians, 1 in 6, and 5 out of 6 of all men of military age, fought in the war. 1200 of the 2260 American casualties were from Most Ken-Kentucky.

tuckians fought on the frontlines of the war.

400 Kentuckians alone were killed in the Battle of River Basin in Michigan in 1813.

According to A. C. Quisenberry, author of "Kentucky 'Regulars' in the War of 1812," "It is probably a fact that that more organizations of regulars were recruited in Kentucky than in any one other one State, owing to the intense military ardor and war spirit of the Kentuckians at that time."

Kentuckians made up the majority of 7th Infantry, 17th Infantry, 19 Infantry, 28th Infantry, and 2nd Rifle Regiments. They also served in 31 other regiments, four battalions, and 12 independent companies.

Thirty Kentucky counties were named after men who served and led in the war. Thomas Metcalfe,

Nicholas County native, served as a captain in the war, and he commanded the defense of Fort Meigs in Ohio in 1813. Nicholas Numerous

Countians volunteered for the war as well.

Bath Neighboring County, formed in 1811,

The Olympian Springs Resort was built in 1800 and served as an end point of the first stage coach route in Kentucky. In 1813, Col. Thomas Deve Owings raised and trained the 27th Infantry Regiment with his own funds, and the resort served as their camp ground before they left for the front.

also played a significant role in the conflict.

The 28th Infantry Regiment was created by an act of Congress in January, 1813, and its recruitment was assigned to Kentucky.

Thomas Deve Owings, owner of the Slate (also known as the Bourbon) Iron Furnace, received a commission as Colonel in April 1813 and served along with Lt. Col. Anthony Butler of Logan Co., and Maj. William Trigg of Mercer County.

Owings raised a regi-

ment of 377 soldiers from the region and trained them at his own expense. The Olympian Spring Resort, located in southern Bath County, served as the encampment and training ground for the 28th Infantry Regiment.

The 28th Regiment was became a part of Gen. William Henry Harrison's army of the Northwest in Sept. 1813.

Gen. Harrison's troops captured Detroit on Sept. 29. They eventually defeated British General Proctor and his Shawnee

allies at the Battle of the Thames (located northwest of Detroit). It was at this battle that the Shawnee Chief Tecumseh was killed.

28 soldiers from the regiment joined Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry's fleet as sharpshooters in the rigging of the ships, and they participated in Perry's defeat the British fleet at the Battle of Lake Erie, Sept. 10, 1813.

Owings' Slate Furnace had made ammunition for the American government since 1807. In 1814, the Furnace manufactured 22 and 32 lb. cannon balls used by Col. Andrew Jackson at the Battle of New Orleans, which marked the defeat of British forces.

Owings was honorably discharged from the military on June 15, 1815. Owings had been elected as state representative in 1812, and he was elected again in 1815 and 1818. He also served as state senator in 1823.

The war ended the animosity between the United States and the British, and the Shawnee Indians, who were allied with the British, no longer challenged settlers for control of the Kentucky territory.

Ingredients: 1 1/2 teaspoons unflavored gelatin 1 tablespoon water 3 cups low-fat milk, di-

3 large egg yolks 1 14-ounce can non-

vided

fat sweetened condensed milk 1/4 cup unsweetened

cocoa powder

2 ounces chopped unsweetened chocolate

Directions:

1.Sprinkle gelatin over water in a small bowl; let stand, stirring once or twice, while you make the base for the ice cream. 2.Pour 1 1/2 cups milk

into a large saucepan. Add cocoa and chocolate to the milk.

3.Heat the milk mix-

ture over medium heat until steaming. Whisk egg yolks and condensed milk in a medium bowl. Gradually pour in the hot milk, whisking until blended. Return the mixture to the pan and cook over medium heat, stirring with a wooden spoon, until the back of the spoon is lightly coated, 3 to 5 minutes. Do not bring to a boil or the custard will curdle.

4.Strain the custard through a fine-mesh sieve into a clean large bowl. Add the softened gelatin and whisk until melted. Whisk in the remaining 1 1/2 cups milk. Cover and refrigerate until chilled, at least 2 hours.

5. Whisk the ice cream mixture and pour into the canister of an ice cream maker. Freeze according to manufacturer's directions. If necessary, place the ice cream in the freezer to firm up before serving.

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Government: It's your Choice

Citizens of Nicholas County are being presented with a petition that has been developed to change the form of the county government. This petition is being circulated by a few people who are stating that the citizens Nicholas County are dissatisfied with the way the Fiscal Court has been running throughout the years and would like to seek a change of government. According to the Legislative Research Commission's "Duties of Elected Officials", the county commissioners hold no other powers or duties

bers of the fiscal court. According to Section 144 of the Kentucky Constitution the only difference between the magistrates and commissioners are that the magistrates are elected from districts in the general election while commissioners are elected from the county at large in general elections.

beyond those held as mem-

There are only 15 out of 120 counties that hold a commissioner form of government. Those include the Commonwealth's most populous counties. These counties included with their population are Bath (11,085), Boone (85,991), Boyd (49,752), Breathitt (16,100), Campbell (91, 540), Daviess (91,545), Graves (37,028), Greenup (36,391), Johnson (23,445), Kenton (151,464), Leslie (12,401), McCracken (65,514), Marshall (30,125), Mason (16,800), and Montgomery (22,554). This year Clark County chose the commissioner form of government.

Some of the surrounding counties that are under a commissioner government are Bath, Montgomery, Clark and Scott County.

According to local citizen, Dorsey Watkins, who is a supporter of the commissioner form of government, "the fiscal court could increase the taxes through the compensating rate every year without it being voted on."

Michelle McDonald, Nicholas County PVA. "The compensating rate is .04% (four tenths of one percent). Of the 13 years I have been in office the fiscal court has taken the comp rate 9 times, as I recall, and has only raised the overall county rate 3 times.

The complete Kentucky Revised Statues are being implemented within this article to inform the people of the correct procedures change the form of government. They are as fol-

lowed: 67.050 KRS County Commissioners-Election to ascertain having-return to prior form of government states any county may have a fiscal court consisting of the county judge/executive and three (3) commissioners elected from the county at large. To ascertain whether the county county commissioners, the county judge/executive, upon an application by written petition signed by registered voters of the county equal in number to at least fifteen percent (15%) of the total number of votes cast in the county in the preceding presidential election or one thousand two hundred (1,200) registered voters of the county, whichever is less, shall enter an order on his order book calling an election to submit to the legal voters of the county the following question: "Are you for or against having a fiscal court composed of three (3) commissioners and the county judge/executive?" The order shall be entered at the next regular term after the petition is filed, and shall direct the election to be held at the next regular election to be held in the

county if the order is filed

with the county clerk not

later than the second Tuesday in August proceeding the day of the regular

election. The county clerk shall give to the sheriff or

other officer appointed to hold the election a certified copy of the order within five (5) days after the order is made, and the sheriff or other officer shall have the order published pursuant to KRS Chapter 424 and in addition advertise it by printed handbills posted at one (1) or more conspicuous places in each precinct in the county for the length of time that publication is required, stating when the election will be held and the purpose thereof.

(2) All such elections shall be held under the general election laws. No such election shall be held in any county more often than once in four (4) years. (3) Any county that has

voted in favor of having county commissioners may return to its prior form of government by following the same procedures as provided in subsections (1) and (2) of this section, by which it chose to have county commissioners. A petition for an election on a return to a fiscal court composed of justices of the peace and the county judge/ executive shall state a proposed number of justices of the peace. The question to be submitted to the voters shall be in the following form: "Are you in favor of a return to a fiscal court

composed of the county judge/executive and (insert the proposed number of justices) justices of the peace who shall represent specific districts within the county?"

(4) If a majority of the votes cast at an election held under subsection (3) of this section are in favor of a return to a fiscal court composed of justices of the peace and the county judge/ executive, the fiscal court shall, if necessary, initiate proceedings to reapportion the justices districts, and such reapportionment shall conform to the requirements of KRS 67.045. The change in the composition of the fiscal court shall become effective upon the assumption of office of justices of the peace elected at the next regular election for that office. If the majority of the

votes are casted that citizens want a change of government the County Judge/Executive shall no later than the first Monday in January in the year of the regular election for county officers, divide the county into three districts as nearly equal in population as practicable, according to KRS 67.060 County commissioners -- Election,

votes cast at an election held under KRS 67.050 are in favor of the fiscal court being composed of the county judge/executive and three (3) commissioners, the county judge/executive shall, no later than the first Monday in January in the year of the regular election for county officers, divide the county into three (3) districts as nearly equal in population as practicable, and shall establish the boundary lines of each of the three (3) commissioner districts so that each district is an unbroken area and not split or divided by another commissioner district. At the next regular election for county officers, and every four (4) years thereafter, there shall be elected by the voters of the entire county three (3) commissioners, one (1) from each district who, with the county judge/executive, shall constitute the fiscal court.

(2) (a) In any county containing a city of the first class, which county has heretofore voted in favor of a fiscal court composed of the county judge/executive and three (3) county commissioners, the county judge/executive shall divide the county into three

tion, the districts to be designated for identification purposes by the letters A, B and C, respectively.

(b) The three (3) commissioners shall be elected by the qualified voters of the county at large at regular elections held every four (4) years. One commissioner shall represent District A and shall be elected at the regular election in the year 1973, and two (2) commissioners, who shall represent Districts B and C, respectively, shall be elected at the regular election in the year 1975.

(3) Persons seeking the nomination of a political party as candidate for the office of county commissioner shall, where a primary election is required for such political party, be voted upon exclusively by the eligible voters of the district in which the person resides and seeks to represent. Persons seeking the nomination of a minor political party, persons who file as independent candidates or persons seeking the nomination in counties containing cities of the second or third but not a city of the first class shall not be subject to the provisions of this paragraph. They shall be nominated by the

representing one of the three (3) districts, a person shall have been a bona fide resident of the district he proposes to represent for at least one (1) year immediately preceding the election, and, upon election, shall continue to reside within the district he was elected to represent for the duration of his term of office, under penalty of forfeiture of the office.

(5) Commissioners elected under this section shall take the oath of office and enter upon the discharge of their duties on the first Monday in January after their election, and shall serve for terms of four (4) years and until their successors are elected and qualify, or until the effective date of a return to a fiscal court composed of justices of the peace and the county judge/executive.

Clarification: in last week's Mercury we incorrectly stated that Bourbon County had a commissioner form of government; they are under a magisterial government. And any election of commissioners, if citizens chose a commissioner form of government, would be held at the regular Primary election of 2014, not a special election.



- Use common sense when fireworks. Spectators should keep a safe distance from



- When possible, avoid outdoor activities during the hours between 10am and 4pm, when the sun's rays are the strongest.
- Always wear a broad-spectrum (protection against both UVA and UVB) sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of loosely woven fabric. 15 higher.
- sunscreen frequently, especially after swimming, perspiring heavily or drying off with a towel.
- Wear a hat with a 4-inch brim all around because it pro-

tects areas often exposed to the sun, such as the neck, ears, eyes, forehead, nose, and scalp.

- Wear ing to protect as much skin as possible. Longsleeved shirts, long pants, or long skirts are the most protective. Dark colors provide more protection than light colors by preventing more UV from reaching your skin. A tightly woven fabric provides greater protection than
- To protect your blistering Be sure to apply eyes from sun damage, wear sunglasses that block 99 to 100 percent of UVA and UVB radiation.
 - Consider wearing cosmetics and lip protectors with an SPF of at least 15 to protect

your skin year-round.

- Swimmers should remember to regularly reapply sunscreen. UV rays reflect off water and sand, increasing the intensity of UV radiation.
- Some medications, such as antibiotics, can increase your skin's sensitivity to the sun. Ask your doctor or pharmacist for more information about the medications you are taking.
- Children need extra protection from the sun. One or two sunburns before the age of 18 dramatically increases the risk of skin cancer. Encourage children to play in the shade, wear protective clothing and apply sunscreen regularly.
