Board starts to rebuild Fire Department

Following several days of uncertainty regarding the status of Nicholas County's Fire Department, the Fiscal Court met in special session last Tuesday to appoint Tracy Brown to serve on the board. Following the meeting, Judge Executive Kenny Lyons said, "Everybody I've talked to speaks well of her." He noted that she said that she would serve on the board if asked.

Brown's appointment was the latest in a number of new appointments following the resignation of a majority of board

trustees as well as a majority of county fire fighters the previous week. This occurred in the wake of the appointment of Doug French as County Fire Chief.

During the previous week a number of new trustees were appointed to the board, including Jay Morford, Steve Weidle, and Johnny Parton.

Later Tuesday evening, the Fire Board held a special called meeting to elect officers to the board. The meeting was presided over by Vice-Chair Doug McCord.

New trustee Johnny Parton said that under Robert's Rules of Order, the vice-chair automatically becomes chair of a



board on the resignation of the chair.

McCord said that he didn't want to become chair, and Trustee Ronnie Clark agreed that McCord didn't have to accept the position.

Following a brief discussion, trustees voted to name Brown as secretary, Steve Weidle as treasurer, and Al Warner as chair. Warner said that he would serve as chair as long as his health allowed.

The newly reorganized Nicholas County Fire Board met for the first time and took stock of the tasks before them during another special called meeting Friday.

All trustees of the

board were present, including Chair Al Warner, Vice Chair Doug Mc-Cord, Treasurer Steve Weidle, Secretary Tracy Brown, Johnny Parton, Ronnie Clark, and Jay Morford. County Fire Chief Doug French and Carlisle City Chief Jim Biddle were also pres-

The meeting got off to a tense start after Jay Morford requested a brief recess to discuss something in private individually with Johnny Parton and Al Warner. Following the recess, Warner made a motion to nominate Johnny Parton as parliamentarian for the Fire Board.

A parliamentarian is

entrusted with making sure that the correct procedures and rules of order are followed during meetings.

nie Clark; and Jay Morford.

Ronnie Clark vigorously opposed the motion, saying, "If the chair can't do it, then he needs to step down." He also noted that this action was not on the agenda for this special called meeting.

Morford replied that this action was within the powers of the chair at any meeting of the board and that a parliamentarian has no authority other than as an

Clark said that this had never been brought up in all the years he

had served on boards. Parton said that most boards had parliamentarians and that it was within their power as a board to do this at this meeting.

Morford and Clark continued to argue over the matter, and they had to be brought to order by Warner. "I don't want to get into a contest here tonight," Warner said.

The first item on the agenda concerned the placement of special fire fighters for the Prom weekend, or alternately, the rescinding, or undoing, of the resignations of the county fire fighters which had taken place the previous week.

K-9 Unit Assists Local Police in Arrest

Bourbon County High School and Middle School were placed on lockdown last Wednesday morning due to a robbery of a drug store. According to the Paris Police Department, the robbery happened at approximately 9 a.m. at Wilson Drug, which is located approximately a block away from the high school.

A Bourbon County woman told police that she was sitting in the drive through of the pharmacy to retrieve her prescription from the clerk when an unidentified man seized the

medication and escaped on foot. Upon questioning, witnesses informed police that the thief was wearing cargo pants and a black mask. Although investigators stated that this type of thievery is uncommon, the motive of the incident was likely to attain narcotics.

Paris Police Department called the Carlisle City Police for Chief Darrell Layne, along with the K-9 unit, Hancock, to assist in the search for the suspect. Upon search of the surrounding area, K-9 Unit Hancock discovered the receipt for the drugs and the paper bag which formerly housed the prescription in question.s

Last Thursday, Paris

police were called in regards to an individual that fit the description of the perpetrator in the Wilson Drug Store theft. Even though the individual was identified as not being the suspect from the drug store robbery, it was discovered that the individual had two warrants from Florida and Georgia. Upon this discovery, officers placed the individual under arrest. The suspect then escaped from the police cruiser, assistance was requested for the Carlisle Chief of Police Darrell Layne and the K-9 unit to assist. The perpetrator was apprehended shortly after assistance was called.

Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

The air was so heavy with humidity that you could almost choke on it, and within only a few steps of entering the wooded hillside that runs along Delaney Road in western Fleming County, sweat was dripping off my face.

One second I was standing in the shade on the road and the next I stepped over the guardrail and took a few steps into the ravine where the human remains of 'at least two young men' have been found since April 27 when Greg Myers, a local resident, who found a human skull that day while he was cleaning out the front of a culvert on his property. That culvert drains a tributary of Buchanan Creek beneath the roadway and skirts the edge of the Myers property before flowing downstream and

Since Myers' discovery other human remains have been found.

into Buchanan Creek.

Among the remains, investigators indicate two human leg bones have

They do not match one another and once belonged to two separate individu-

There is no confirmation yet regarding the likeli-

to one of those two individuals. There could be remains of two individuals, three individuals or even more scattered along that hillside and drainage.

It's a troubling development, no matter where your speculation leads. There was a time when

I was growing up in rural

Fleming County when this entire region had much in common with the TV town of Mayberry. Those days are over, even though many of our families and communities

still embrace the decent, strong, rural values that have been time-honored in this area of Kentucky. I've been in the report

ing and news editing business since the year 2000. As sad as it may sound I

could not accurately count the number of homicides and strange deaths I have reported on in our region since that time. They are simply to numerous to quickly count. The remains found

along Delaney Road are disturbingly close to an area I dubbed the Blue Licks Triangle, early in my journalism career.

It encompasses an area very close to the infamous Lower Blue Licks, a geographic anomaly within ithood of the skull belonging self, where saline and me-

dicinal waters once burst munity of Barterville, in been no articles of human massive response by Kenforth from the very ground alongside the Licking River, very near the area where Robertson, Nicholas and Fleming County, join one another.

It was a place Native Americans held sacred for centuries before the arrival of Kentucky pioneers and a place they guarded closely.

I've studied over one dozen incidents of violent conflict between factions of Native Americans and Kentucky pioneers that oc-

curred there. The Native Americans were victorious in each encounter, particularly so in the infamous Battle of Lower Blue Licks, fought in August of 1782.

There have been violent incidents historically near the area and one particular series of unsolved murders just south of the Blue Licks Battlefield State Resort Park remain un-

In my reporting in the past, in various publications, I have referred to these as "The Blue Licks Triangle Murders."

Donnie Dixon was murdered at his property in Oct. 1999 near the intersection of Headquarter's Road and US 68.

David Sadler was murdered at his home on Abner's Mills Road in March

Roger Scotty Fulton was living on Crooked Creek either late 2003 or early 2004.

partially decomposed remains were discovered in Feb. 2004 near the Johnson Creek Covered Bridge, near the confluence of Johnson Creek and one of its tributaries..

If you take a map and plot an "x" where Donnie Dixon lived and was murdered, then place another "x" on the map where David Sadler lived and was murdered, and then place an "x" where Roger Scotty Fulton lived (and where he may have been murdered) and you draw a straight line and connect the xs, vou will have drawn a near-perfect triangle; A triangle in rural Nicholas County that designated where three men-all very good friends-best friends by many accounts-lived and most-likely died. (Fulton's body was found just a couple of miles from his last home of record.)

Unsolved murders of three good friends all living in a section of rural Nicholas County that contains no more than a 250 citizens, is a disturbing scenario to even the most callous of us.

Delaney Road is so close to where David Sadler lived, you can't help but rub your head when you examine the map of the Blue Licks Triangle.

County single mother who was last seen on Frenchburg Hill on Monday Jan.19, 2009 as she walked away from a car driven by her former boyfriend Josh Brown. Law enforcement personnel, emergency search and rescue teams and private citizens looked for Nicole in the days following her disappearance. The long days turned into weeks and months until her disarticulated skeletal remains were found Monday afternoon April 21 just inside the Powell County line near Indian Creek.

Her remains were found approximately 15 miles from where Brown told police he last saw her.

There was never any clothing, shoes, jewelry or any items found with Miss Van Zant. Perhaps all of this is

purely coincidental.

Perhaps it is something much more sinister.

Unsolved crimes, particularly unsolved murders are an open wound upon the families of the victims and the entire communities where the victims called home.

Investigators ly thought the remains The 27-year-old Menifee might have been from Hispanic individuals and that would explain why there were no missing persons reports being filed in the region, but now they tell me the remains may be Caucasians; Young males.

"Our goal is to restore

the community's peace of mind," Sean Welch Investigative Lt for Post 8, told me at the scene on Delaney Road last week. "We will deal with the issue at hand and hope to notify the families of these two individuals and deal with a crime, if that is what has occurred." Welch said preliminary reports from forensic anthropologists with the Kentucky Medical Examiner's Office indicate the remains were placed on the site within the past six months to three years.

There are people out there that know what happened to Donnie Dixon, David Sadler and Scotty Fulton.

There are people out there that know what happened to Nicole Van Zant.

There are people out there that know what happened just off of Delaney Road.

And God knows too.

Nicholas County opens Public Library **Workforce Center**

FRANKFORT, Ky. (May 3, 2012) - Nicholas County residents seeking employment opportunities now have more computer access, training and job workshops at the new Public Library Workforce Center (PLWC). The Nicholas County Public Library is one of 46 public libraries in the state that will have a PLWC.

The centers house computers and software that will be used to provide training in a formal workshop setting to Kentucky residents seeking employment opportunities.

"The new centers will help Kentuckians who do not have access to computers and broadband service to use 21st century technology to access training, jobs and economic opportunities," said Gov. Steve Beshear. "Our local public libraries have become an important community access point for people to search for jobs, write resumes and learn computer skills. These centers will provide a direct link to help for people in areas with high unemployment lev-

The centers are made possible by a \$1.3 million American Reinvestment and Recovery Act (ARRA) Broadband Technology Program Opportunities (BTOP) grant provided through the U.S. Department of Commerce National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA). The project is supported by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and administered by the Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives (KDLA). The grant targets counties with high unemployment.

"We are pleased to use these grant funds to create Public Library Workforce Centers in 46 Kentucky public libraries. The centers will assist their communities in the economic recovery and provide lasting benefits in education and economic development. We are proud to be working with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and partners across the Commonwealth to bring technology and training to so many Kentuckians at their public libraries," said Wayne Onkst, Kentucky's state librarian and commis-

sioner of KDLA. "Our Workforce Center is here to help anyone who is looking for a job and needs some additional computer skills," said library director Becky Reid. "We are here to help the citizens of Nicholas County who do not have access to computers and broadband service to obtain jobs and economic opportunities. The workshops are designed for beginners to intermediate levels. This is a great opportunity to learn the skills you may need to get the job you want. All workshops are free! Look

on our website for times and dates of workshops (nicholascountylibrary. com) or pick up a schedule

of classes at the library." To create its PLWC, the Nicholas County Public Library installed four laptop computers and 12 desktop computers with funds from the BTOP grant. All of the computers have Office 2010. The library has also purchased a laser printer and a digital projector for the center's use. Additionally, the library purchased a large key keyboard, a 22-inch monitor, a trackball mouse and Zoom Text with speech capability software so individuals with disabilities can participate in workshops. The library used more than \$32,900 in grant funds to purchase the equipment, furniture and

Warner said that he had a meeting with all of the county firefighters who had resigned and asked if they would return. He said they informed him that they would not return to service under Doug French as Fire Chief.

Clark wondered who the special fire fighters were and if they would answer to Chief French.

McCord said that asking for special fighters was "a slap in the face to the city" fire department. Warner replied that it was not an insult, that he had only placed the item on the agenda to make sure that there was adequate coverage for the Prom weekend.

Chief Biddle had 15 men on his force, and that he had seven fire fighters. Both French and Biddle agreed that there was enough coverage.

Chief French said that

Clark asked about an audit of the board's finances. Warner said that under present rules, the board was audited every four years. He also said that there are a number of things that need to be done at the county fire department, including revising SOPs, doing inventory, proper testing of equipment, and clean-up and repair to the building.

Parton asked French if he could justify getting that salary for the

would spend with the county fire department. French said that he couldn't justify it, but that there was much that needed to be done there.

Warner said that they needed to discuss numbers. French said that he would like to be able electronically enter the fire and accident runs, from which he would earn \$150 per run. McCord said that they average 6-10 runs per months, and fire fighters Jeremy Hughes said that the electronic entry of runs is a lengthy process.

Parton said that \$150 still seemed like a lot of money. He also suggested that he would throw out \$750 a month for the fire chief as a starting salary. Morford agreed with him.

French made a number of complaints about former Fire Chief Mark Hughes, who he said had received a number of perks in his position over the years, including lights on his truck, a phone, fax machine, and radios.

Parton said the present trustees needed to stay focused on the here-and-now and not dwell on what was done in the past.

Brown asked, "How can we not provide Chief French, even if turn wind up lowering Hughes had abused them?

Parton agreed that French needed to be provided with equipment but that the trustees expected him to him to perform his duties fully.

Clark asked if any chief had been given less in the past.

McCord added that the chief also receives \$20 an hour for meeting with state fire investigators. Brown asked how would they be able to find out about these figures, and McCord said that they should be able to find them in the meeting minutes.

Chief French said that everything he did as chief would be brought to the board for approval. "You will be making more decisions with me as chief," he

Weidle said that he would make sure that the work he does as treasurer would be available for all to see. Biddle noted that

the department would receive extra state aid for filing electronic fire/ accident reports. Bill Denton, who works for the city fire department, said that the use electronically-filed reports would increase the department's ISO

Denton also said that most fire departments give their chief a salary and that new chiefs take on the same duties as the old chief. "If you start plugging in numbers, it will be over \$1000" in salary and perks for a chief.

McCord made a quick phone call and found out that the fire chief is also allowed to receive \$15 an hour for time spent over four hours at a fire or accident scene.

Chief French brought the discussion to a close by saying that he is asking for the same salary that Mark Hughes had received, \$1250 a month. The only extras he requested were to be bonded by the county and for the equipment on his truck, which he said would become the property of the fire department. The trustees unanimously approved this request, along with payment for his training and mileage, based on his providing ad-

equate documentation. The Fire Board held its regular monthly meeting on Tuesday evening, which took place after the Carlisle Mercury went to press. The Mercury will report on this meeting in next week's edition.



I would like to apologize to everyone for missing last month's deadline for this column. Due to the loss of our youngest brother Frank, I couldn't seem to be able to collect my thoughts. On top of that I picked up a virus that was not very good company.

I would like to thank everyone for the prayers and cards I received after his death. They were very much appreciated. It is hard to give a family member up

but we all know he is in a much better place.

We have had quite a bit going on since my last column, some good and some not so good. The big issue is with the County Fire Dept. I wish that we could have set down and worked out this out without all the press getting involved. It seems that the only time we see a T.V. reported is when something negative happens. The court and I caught a lot of criticism over the fire board and the way this is handled. Anyone can look at the KY Revised Statutes and plainly see that once a taxing district is established and that board is set up it is out of our hands. The only thing the court can do is appoint a set number of board members which in this case is three. Two are elected by the citizens and two are elected by the fire fighters. Hopefully with the new board members coming on they can work with the other members and volunteers to get this back on track.

We have a great group of volunteers who want the best for the citizens of this county and I really hate to see the negative remarks that are being made. Also, anyone agreeing to set on a board of any kind is opening there selves up to be criticized whenever they make a decision. If it is cheaper to contract different jobs than it is to do it ourselves then this is what we may have to go to. This is just one way that I am looking at to try and cut costs.

One more thing that I am working on and hope to accomplish is working with Maysville Community College to bring classes to our community. I am getting great support for this project so far and getting help from representatives of the college. If anyone would like to help with this project please give me a call at the office.





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
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NASA has Nicholas County ties

NASA has some Nicholas County ties, Tyler Rose majors in Space Science through Morehead State University. He was a graduate of Nicholas County High in 2008. On April 18, 2012 he traveled to San Luis Obispo, CA to give his third presentation at the annual Spring CubeSat Developers Workshop. Rose has traveled to San Luis Obispo, CA five times and other places around the country for other presentations and design reviews

CubeSat is a miniaturized satellite that is used for space research that has a volume of one liter, and a mass of no more than 1.33 Kilograms. A CubeSat project is approximately a 10 cm Cubic satellite that is developed by university students and is to be launched into orbit. In 2004, with their small size. CubeSats could be made and launched for an estimated \$65,000-\$80,000 with the lower price it makes it viable for schools and universities to develop CubeSats. Statistics show that in 2004, 40-50 universities

were developing Cube-

The presentation covered the performance of CXBN along with the lessons that were learned up to this point. The conference gives academia, industry, and government a chance to meet and discuss technological advancements, ideas for missions, system performance on ground or in orbit.

Some of the task that Rose had to perform while getting involved in space systems while at MSU, were small satellites (ranging from 4x4x4 inches 20x20x20 inches). The most notable was a project called the Cosmic X-ray Background Nanosatellite (CXBN) that was awarded to MSU through NASA's Educational Launch of a Nanosatellite (ELaNa) program. The ELaNA VI Program entitled MSU to a free launch provided they deliver the satellite on time. Rose was granted the student engineering team lead on the project shortly after the letter was received. With being the leading student on the project, he not only designed, developed, and tested subsystems on the satellite, and also led all of the team meetings and design reviews of long multiple hours that were held in front of NASA and NRO officials. Every subsystem in CXBN was designed and built at MSU's Space Science Center within one year. Rose delivered CXBN to California Polytechnic State University in January 2012 for integration into its launcher. Since January 2012 the launcher has been integrated into the rocket, expecting to launch with satellites built by other universities, corporations, and government organizations in August of this year. If the CXBN is successfully ejected into space from the launcher, it will serve as Kentucky's first orbital spacecraft.

"My main goal concerning the satellite for the team is to communicate with CXBN while on orbit. Communication with the satellite, even if we receive a little bit of data from it, will be substantial gain for the team, the university, and the state. There are many objectives beyond just being able to communicate with the satellite, such as being able to reprogram the satellites subsystem while on orbit." Stated Tyler.

Rose has stated that he would like to continue learning by applying to graduate schools. He has been accepted to the University of Michigan for a Master of Engineering in Space Engineering program and he is planning on visiting U of M also. There are many small projects underway at the university. A professor at University of Michigan leading their small satellite projects has offered me a position working for him while taking classes-similar to his experience at More-"I am not sure where

my field will take me following graduate school. Opportunities in the space industry are typically found outside of Kentucky. However, no matter where my field takes me, I envision myself returning to Kentucky." Rose said.

Rose stated that he selected MSU for his undergraduate degree because of his scholarships, and MSU location was close to home, and because of their Space Science program was 1 of 5 in the nation. He thought when he signed up that he was going to

study stars, planets, and galaxies, it quickly came to realization that when he was applying for courses there was a lot more than just astronomy. After taking the first electronic course he decided to stay with the program. "I feel very lucky and

now very grateful to have selected the space program instead of astrophysics, mathematics or other fields that I considered." Rose replied A few of the team

members and Rose spent countless nights and mornings at the space science center working on CXBN. The project was supplementary to the coursework.

"It was one of the best things I have ever done." answered Tyler. "it challenged me more than I've ever been challenged before, provided me with skills, knowledge and resources I need for the space industry."

Tyler stated that he would recommend to graduates today that are planning to go into the same program to stick with it if they are sure that they enjoy the subject matter. There is a very steep learning curve to the projects and to some of the courses,

but if they like electronics, space technology, software, 3D CAD modeling, dynamics or astronomy,, the program is

"I would like to thank community, my the family, and my friends for their support while I've been at Morehead. I have had a lot of good times in Kentucky, first in Carlisle, then in Morehead. My family has been there for me every step of the way since I was born. I haven't been able to spend as much time with them during the last year as I would have liked to, but I cannot describe how much I appreciate them. I want to thank my entire family and Kara for encouraging me, always being there, and for putting up with me over the past few years."

He added.

Tyler is the son of the Susan Rose Rogers and the late Gene Rose. He is the grandson of Delmus and Kathy Murrell. His hobbies are technology, computers, gadgets, basketball, and water sports, designing/building and traveling.

also utilizes the Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement Funds.



INSPECTION PERIOD FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Nicholas County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 7 through May 21, 2012. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2012, assessment on which state, county, and school taxes for

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must

held prior to or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day fol-

lowing the conclusion of the inspection period. A taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be

eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals. Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of ssessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provi-tions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the

provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the property valuation administrator. He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fai cash value of his property.



This protest must be accordance with KRS 131.110 The final decision of the department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

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COMER ENCOURAG-ES PRODUCERS AND ORGANIZATIONS

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Kentucky producers and organizations may apply to the Kentucky Department of Agriculture for funding from the Specialty Crop Block Grant Program. "Kentucky's climate

and soil are well suited for production of specialty crops," Agriculture Commissioner James Comer said. "These funds will help expand specialty Kentucky's crop production and diversify our agriculture industry. I encourage all eligible individuals and organizations to apply." Specialty crops are

defined by USDA as fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, dried fruits, horticulture, and nursery crops. Kentucky received a grant of \$260,991.65 from USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service for projects that enhance the competitiveness of specialty crops in Kentucky.

Commodity groups, agriculture organizations, colleges and universities, producers, municipalities, state agencies, and nonprofit organizations may apply provided their proposals meet all the specifications in the Request for Applications and USDA's Notice of Federal Assistance. Proposed projects must aim to enhance the production and competitiveness of Kentucky specialty crops. Applicants must reside in Kentucky, or their business or educational affiliation must be in Kentucky. The maximum award


will be \$75,000. The Department encourages applications requesting smaller amounts. Applications should show how the project potentially impacts and produces measurable outcomes for the specialty crop industry and/or the public. Grant funds will not be awarded for projects that solely provide a profit to a single organization, institution, or individual. Matching funds are encouraged but not required.

Applications must be postmarked no later than June 1. The Department plans to announce awards in November.

Kentucky producers took in cash receipts of \$72 million from sales of greenhouse and nursery products, \$23 million from vegetables and melons, and almost \$11 million from fruits, nuts, and berries, including apples and peaches, in 2010, according to the Kentucky office of the Agricultural National Statistics Service.

A number of Mathers Fund Scholarships were announced to be awarded to Nicholas County High School students wishing to attend college after graduation. The scholarships will be given to 47 qualifying applicants who will each be given a \$500 scholarship. Each student will be given \$200 dollars to fund the first semester of a University, and \$300 to fund the second semester. The court believes that this will assist in the prevention of loss of money to the fund due to some students dropping out of college.

ATTORNEY GENERAL CONWAY JOINS \$1.6 BIL-LION HEALTHCARE FRAUD

FRANKFORT, Ky. (May 7, 2012) – Attorney General Jack Conway announced today that Kentucky has joined other states and the federal government in reaching two independent settlements totaling \$1.6 billion with Abbott Laboratories to settle civil and criminal allegations that the drug company illegally marketed the drug Depakote.

"I am pleased that these settlements have been reached and that we are able to recover money for a vital state program and for taxpayers," General Conway said. "These settlements should serve as a warn-

ing to other drug companies that the off-label marketing of drugs is illegal, puts the public's health at risk and will not be tolerated."

The states contend that from January 1998 through December 31, 2008, Abbott promoted the sale and use of Depakote for uses that were not approved by the Food and Drug Administration as safe and effective. This alleged conduct resulted in false claims to Medicaid and other federal healthcare programs. Further, the covered conduct from the settlement provides that Abbott Laboratories made false and misleading statements about the

safety, efficacy, dosing and cost-effectiveness of Depakote for some unapproved uses; improperly marketed the product in nursing homes; and paid illegal remuneration to health care professions and long term care pharmacy providers to induce them to promote and/or prescribe Depakote.

The \$1.5 billion Medicaid settlement is the second largest recovery from a pharmaceutical company in a single civil and criminal global resolution. Abbott Laboratories will pay the 49 states, the District of Columbia and the federal government a total of \$800 million in civil damages and penalties to compensate Medicaid, Medicare, and various federal healthcare programs for harm suffered as a result of its conduct.

In addition to the civil settlement, Abbott Laboratories pled guilty this morning to a violation of the Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act (FDCA) and agreed to pay a criminal fine and forfeiture of \$700 million. Abbott Laboratories will also enter into a Corporate Agreement Integrity with the United States Department of Health and Human Services, Office of the Inspector General.

This settlement is based on four qui tam cases that were consolidated and are pending in the United States District Court for the Western District of Virginia in Abingdon, Virginia. The cases were filed under Federal and State false claims statutes.

Meanwhile, Kentucky, 44 other states and the District of Columbia settled claims that Abbott's off-label marketing and unfair and deceptive promotional practices violated Kentucky's Consumer Protection Act. Abbott will pay \$100 million to settle those claims nationally and has agreed to injunctive terms that should restrict the company's

ability to peddle Depakote for off-label uses.

Kentucky will receive a total of \$4,626,425 to settle the civil allegations against Abbott Laboratories. That includes \$2,978,845 in restitution and other recovery under the Medicaid settlement and \$1,647,580 to settle violations to Kentucky's Consumer Protection Act.



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
