Sidles and Moss win by landslide

Although less than half of the registered voters cast their ballot during Tuesday's election in Nicholas County, the ones who did spoke loud and clear by handing landslide victories to Jeff "Bubba" Sidles for the office of Nicholas County Sheriff and electing Martha Moss as the new County Clerk.

Nicholas County had a 39 percent voter turnout with approximately 2,120 votes being cast from the 5,356 registered voters.

Sidles garnered almost 70 percent of the votes for Sheriff, with Moss garnering nearly 60 percent for County Clerk.



The results for the office of Sheriff of Nicholas County were as follows: candidate Mark Long received 201 votes; candidate Robert Bussell received 21 votes; candidate Kevin Booth received 305 votes; candidate Robert Carson received 42 votes; and candidate Sheriff Jeff Sidles received 1,409 votes.

Sidles carried each voting precinct by large margins.

The results for the office of County Clerk for Nicholas County were as follows: candidate Darlene Davis received 313 votes; candidate Tara R. Duncan received 114 votes; candidate Paula Gray Hunter received 186 votes; Deborah Fry-



man received 344 votes; and Martha Livingood Moss emerged victorious, receiving 1,027 votes and carrying each of the voter precincts by large margins.

The office of Jailor was won by Darren Robinson, due to the withdrawal of candidate James W. McGlothlin, according to election officials.

The results for the United States Representative of 6th Congressional District primaries were also announced for Nicholas County. The results were as follows: candidate Patrick J. Kelly received 13 votes; candidate Curtis Kenimer received 18 votes; and candidate Andy Barr emerged victorious with 78 votes.

Also announced were the results of the G.O.P. primary for the Republican candidate for the President of the United States. The results were as follows: candidate Newt Gingrich received 2 votes; candidate Rick Santorum received 12 votes; candidate Ron Paul received 26 votes; and candidate Mitt Romney succeeded, receiving 67 votes. There were 8 committed votes cast for Nicholas County in this ballot.

The votes for office of the President of the United States were also tabulated. President Barack Obama emerged with 594 votes, though 698 uncommitted votes were also counted.

Nigerian Facebook scam targets local lady

Some Facebook friends aren't very friendly; In fact, they can be downright criminal!

A local Carlisle Woman, Leslie Archambeault, found that out recently after she began a friendly chat with a Nigerian man on Facebook, a very popular, social network Internet site.

The Nigerian man was all-too friendly, and convinced Archambeault to believe in their friendship. He also led her to believe that she could make \$300 a month working from her home.

Archambeault received a package in the mail on Thursday May 17, which was wrapped

in a brown paper bag and included approximately 80 or more money orders and checks totaling \$132, 264.00 dollars.

The requirement for her to earn money was by cashing the money orders/checks and keeping a small portion while sending the bulk amount to the Nigeria.

Archambeault thought it was suspicious, and contacted the Carlisle Police Department to investigate. Officer Mark Snedegar responded to the call.

"I have been in contact with other counties that seem to be having the same issue," Snedegar said. "I am working closely with the Secret Services and KSP, to investigate this incident."

The money orders from Western Union and the US Postal Ser-

vice were blank, with an exception of the amount of \$865.55. Checks from Chase Bank were made for the amount of \$3,450.00, and forged Bank of America documents were made out in the amount of \$2,650.00. Both of the checks had an unidentified name on them. The money orders and checks were not made from normal watermark paper. They were from a heavier weight paper with a different texture, according to investigators.

According to Snedegar, the money involved in scams like these have been known to fund terrorist organizations. The source of this scam remains at least partially unknown.

"I ask that everyone be alert and cautious while social networking, to



be aware of things that are being sent to you in the mail, and cautious about what information you give out to other people on the network, or phone." Snedegar replied "Store owners need to be aware of this type of scam to where they don't cash suspicious money orders."

Several scams are de-

veloped through social networking and Snedegar and other law enforcement officers and agencies recommend that if you don't know the person or company, or if you are asked to give your banking information, credit card number or Social Security Number, you should discontinue speaking

with them, call your local authorities and report the incident.

A burglar remains at large after recently breaking into several vehicles, a home and a Carlisle business.

During the late evening-early morning hours of May 13-14 someone broke into several vehicles, a house on Dorsey Avenue and Family Dollar store.

Investigators said that the thieves seemed to be mostly interested in money and change found in the cars, they did not bother jewelry or gas cards that were in the cars and the investigators also said the thieves were largely unsuccessful at the Family Dollar Store.



prominent Carlisle business was noticed early Monday morning May 14 by Family Dollar employee Lisa Sapp. Sapp noticed one of the window panes was shattered and several items near the company safe had been moved but no items were taken.

She immediately called police and Family Dollar Manager Mary Ann Browning.

"It looked as if the suspect(s) used a ball bat to tap the seal of the window pane that created it to shatter and gave them access by pushing the panel out like a flapping door," Carlisle Police Officer Shane Adams said after responding to the call. Officer Adams and others believe the safe was the target of the crime but luckily the safe was strongly secured and could

not be moved or opened.

Officer Adams is also investigating the burglaries of the house and nearby cars and asks that all residents remain vigilant and careful with their personal property.

"Citizens need to keep their car doors locked and keep all loose change hidden in console and out of site," he said. According to Ad-

ams, citizens saw a 5'8" build white male about 150 pounds wondering around the area at the suspected time of the crimes. That individual has not been identified, nor has there been any arrests made in connections with these crimes as the Mercury goes to print.

Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

It came to pass that I found myself wandering through the Flemingsburg Cemetery on Sunday. I arrived a few minutes before the honor guard of policemen who were going to be paying their respects for John Dee Clark, a former Flemingsburg Chief of Police who was killed in the line of duty on Oct. 4, 1932. Memorial Day will be observed this coming weekend, but for many of us Memorial Day is every day, if only in a quiet place

within our souls. Memorial Day, or Decoration Day as it was formerly known, has a long history and the concept of a national day of observation to honor the dead began in Charleston, South Carolina on May 1, 1865. The Civil War had ended only a few weeks earlier and the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln had occurred only days prior. The city's community of Freedmen (former slaves recently emancipated)

gathered near the Charleston Race track to honor 257 Union soldiers who had perished in a nearby Confederate prison during the war and whose graves had been hastily prepared and unmarked. Today, our nation observes the last Monday in May as the time delegated to honor all servicemen who have perished in a time of war but the day's meaning encompasses the paying of respect for all who have passed on. The Flemingsburg Cemetery contains the graves of my parents, my brother Doug, and many relatives. My step-grandfather, Vic Reeves, was a caretaker of the Flemingsburg

Cemetery in my infancy and youth and I became very familiar with the cemetery at a young age. I always thought of cemeteries as gardens of stone. Ancient trees still dominate the landscape of the Flemingsburg Cemetery and I sought refuge in the shade of one of the stoic catalpa trees Sunday afternoon. It was near the grave of Chief Clark, Dee to all who knew him, where I casually made my way around the graves of family members buried in an Evans family plot in the early 1900s. It was during that time period that three siblings of the Evans family and three members of the Mat-

tox family were married. My grandfather Russ Mattox married Gladys Evans. Gladys's sister, Mattie Evans married Walter Mattox, my grandfather's brother. Mattie died at the age of 21 in 1920 while giving birth. I took a moment at her grave and noticed the tail feather of a hawk was lying on her headstone. I observed it as a "good sign" and thought it strange that when I find a feather, particularly hawk feathers, I either place them on my medicine shield in my home or place them on my parents' headstone, which is about

400 yards away from the Evans plot, in a more recently opened section of the cemetery. After the Clark ceremony I visited my parents' grave, which also holds the ashes of my brother Doug. Earlier that same day my oldest brother Kenny had placed a service plaque at the grave honoring Doug's service to his country. Doug was retired from the Army and worked for Uncle Sam many years after his service to the Big Green Machine ended. If the Good Lord is willing, I'll be placing a hawk feather with him this week.

Police to be out in force through Memorial Day weekend

FRANKFORT, Ky. (May 17, 2012) – Motorists who refuse to wear their seat belts – beware. The 2012 national “Click It or Ticket” Memorial Day seat belt enforcement mobilization kicks off May 21 to help save lives by cracking down on those who don’t buckle up.

Despite a wealth of data showing that seat belts save lives – and also despite implementation of a primary seat belt law – Kentucky’s 82 percent seat belt usage rate lags behind the national rate of 84 percent. Therefore, the Kentucky Office of Highway Safety (KOHS) is supporting state and local law enforcement across the

country in their efforts to strongly enforce seat belt laws around the clock.

“Kentucky undoubtedly experiences far too many fatalities that could have been avoided with the simple use of a seat belt,” said Transportation Cabinet Secretary Mike Hancock. “Clearly this is an indication that people are not taking the law seriously or they are just not aware of the huge risk taken by not buckling up.”

There were 721 total highway fatalities in Kentucky in 2011 with 576 killed in motor vehicles. Fifty-eight percent of those killed in motor vehicles were not wear-

ing a seat belt.

Hancock said the campaign this year will place extra emphasis on enforcement at nighttime, when fatal motor vehicle crashes are most likely to involve vehicle occupants who were not buckled up. Last year, 67 percent of people killed in crashes between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. were unrestrained.

“Too many motorists don’t realize the importance of wearing a seat belt, and are severely injured or killed because of it,” said KOHS Director Bill Bell. “That’s why officers are prepared to ticket anyone not buckled up. No warnings and no excuses.”

The KOHS awarded

more than \$300,000 in federal funds to 64 state and local police agencies across the Commonwealth to help bolster seat belt enforcement during the campaign. The funding is provided through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

Although enforcement officers will be prevalent during the campaign, Bell emphasized, “The ‘Click It or Ticket’ campaign is not about writing tickets. It’s about awareness and saving lives, and we are honored to have a family from Kentucky to help spread this message.”

The family of Megan Miller of Owensboro is

featured in two KOHS public service announcements airing statewide during the enforcement campaign. Megan was killed at age 17 when she was ejected from a vehicle crash.

“For her not to be wearing her seat belt that one day is all it took,” says brother Myles.

“You just don’t think you will ever lose a child that young,” says mother Mischelle. “We miss her so much, and we wanted to do these commercials in her memory. We know she will make a difference.”

According to NHTSA, seat belts, when worn correctly, reduce the risk of fatal injury to

front-seat occupants by 45 percent – and by 60 percent in pickup trucks, SUVs and minivans.

While this year’s “Click It or Ticket” enforcement mobilization runs May 21 through June 3, motorists should know that officers are out enforcing seat belt laws year-round.

“Motorists should buckle up every time they go out, both day and night,” said Bell.

Also mentioned was the consideration to submit an application for the Kentucky Fruit and Vegetable Grant. This grant would allow the students from preschool to 6th grade to be given fruits and vegetables throughout the school day. Although the application is only given to a select few schools, the winners will be given between \$35,000 and \$50,000 as a federal initiative to encourage a healthy diet among young students. A motion was made to approve the submittal of the application for this grant. The motion was passed. Several other issues were discussed in the meeting. Including:

for the 2012-2013 school year were approved. The new price for the school lunch is \$1.75 for students. The breakfast prices will remain the same, as well as the prices of the reduced lunch. The KSDIT insurance proposal was briefly discussed. It was mentioned that the insurance premiums have been fluctuating around \$110,000 to \$118,000 over the past few years.

The new insurance rates will be increased to nearly \$148,000 in educator's liability. Superintendent Gregory Reid briefly expressed his satisfaction over how well the high school graduation went. He stated that he felt the new gymnasium was a blessing, making it more comfortable for parents and graduates to enjoy the ceremony.

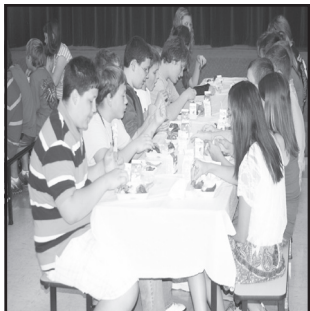

Thoughts from the Pastors Study

Carey McGuire, Pastor First Christian Church, Carlisle, Disciples of Christ

"Life is a"
Life is a game, a dance, a gamble, a pain in the neck or other sensitive body parts and adjectives too personal to list here. You get the idea. The explanation of what life is varies as widely as does the old question, "why is there air".

Scripture gives us two kinds of life; bios-physical, created, mortal life. And Zoë- spiritual, uncreated, eternal life. Likewise there are two kinds of death; telete- physical death, and thanatos- spiritual death. Thus it is entirely possible for a person to be physically alive, yet spiritually dead. But the spiritual that is in Jesus Christ immerses us into the hidden reservoir of divine love and power bringing into our lives God's life (Zoë) forming us into a community of Jesus' disciples who are enabled to express his life and love through our own lives, individually and corporately.

Jesus declares, "I am that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." In his first epistle, John writes, "God gave us eternal life and this life is in his Son." And Paul writes, "for if while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, much more surely having been reconciled, will be saved by his life." The simple and wholly adequate word for salvation in the New Testament is "life".

The goal of life is not to get us into Heaven. Prop-

erly understood Heaven is not a goal at all, but a destination. Heaven is vitally important and part of the package, if you will, but it must never be the center of our attention. Heaven is only a Glorious by product of something far more central. Salvation is a life, and when we have this life, this Zoë, physical death merely becomes minor transition from this life to greater life, since in Christ, we become unceasing spiritual being with an eternal destiny in God's great universe, we can look forward to the greater expression of this life in Heaven, but our focus should be upon the new order of life we now have in Jesus Christ. The real issue is not so much getting us into Heaven, as getting Heaven into us! Besides when we do get to heaven we want to be the kind of person in-

clined to stay there. We must always remember the purifying fires of Heaven are hotter than the fires of hell.

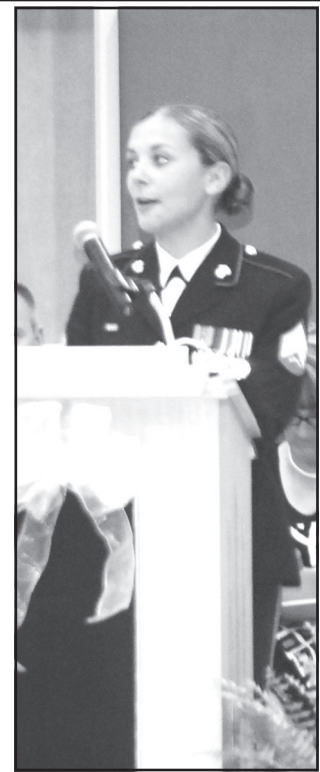

Contention over budget prolongs fiscal court meeting

Disagreements over "rainy day" money and Mathers Fund salaries came close to bringing a first reading of the county budget to a halt during Friday's Fiscal Court morning meeting. Judge Lyons and Nicholas County's magistrates – Steve Hamilton, Jeff Randolph, Darvin Mitchell, Mike Webb, and Jimmy Wells – had recently spent an entire day during a budget workshop hashing out their differences to come up with a county budget. Magistrate Hamilton insisted that the county needed to set aside money in a "rainy day" CD. Wanda Dotson, County Treasurer said that this "rainy day" money was currently being used to balance the budget. "We are going to spend this money,

maybe not all of it. Some of it will carry over. But it's making the budget right now," she said. Hamilton said that regardless of that, the county needed to set aside money, \$50,000 or \$60,000, in savings or as a "nest egg."

Dotson noted that at some point, the county is going to have to raise taxes. Lyons agreed, saying that the county could not wait until the money is gone before something is done. A vote was taken on the first reading of the bud-

get, with three no votes by Hamilton, Webb, and Price, and two yes votes by Mitchell and Randolph. Randolph said, "If I have to come in here and have another vote on a first reading...this is pathetic." Another flashpoint issue

affecting the first reading of the budget was administrators' salaries for the Mathers Fund. It was recently publically revealed that the administrators of the Fund – Treasurer Dotson, Secretary Dana Price, and Payroll Secretary Reva Fuller – were all given a \$56 a month raise in 2008 that was paid out of the Mathers Fund by former Judge Executive Larry Tincher without formal Fiscal Court approval. The will which bequeathed the money at the basis of the Mathers Fund was also sent to probate court for a determination of what the Fiscal Court can actually do with the money. Hamilton and Webb expressed their discomfort in approving a budget that included the salary amounts until the county received an Attorney General's opinion, which was requested in April.

"Take the \$56 out of my pay – I'm sick and tired of this," Dotson said. Dotson reminded the Magistrates that an approved budget had to be given to Frankfort in 30 days. Hamilton then said that he would only approve the budget if the \$50,000 was set aside and if the Mathers Fund salaries were set back to their original amounts until the Attorney General provides an opinion. Judge Lyons had to bring the meeting back to order after Dotson, Hamilton and Wells began arguing amongst themselves. The Magistrates eventually agreed to approve the first reading of the budget with two separate motions, one approving the "rainy day" fund of \$50,000 and another in which the Mathers Fund salaries were set at the amount allotted until the Attorney General issues his opinion.

Mercury Memories

Nicholas County resident and conservation officer William Allan Earlywine helped save the life of fellow conservation officer Corey Ellis following the tragic boating accident on the Licking River on May 14. They were searching for illegal nets along the Nicholas and Harrison county lines when their boat struck a submerged log and flipped in swift water. Earlywine received bruises and contusions, but was not seriously injured when the boat capsized and threw both officers in to the river. During the accident, Ellis suffered blow to the head, rendering him unconscious. Earlywine immediately called for his partner. When there was no answer, Earlywine noticed Ellis' yellow life preserver and swam to catch him in the swift current. Officials say the inflatable life preservers worn by the officers kept the accident from becoming a tragedy. The Carlisle-based National Guard unit recently received mobilization orders for Operation Iraqi Freedom. The unit will depart Carlisle from the National Guard Army on June 5. According to the press release, the unit's mission will be to provide "convoy security" and "force protection." Approximately 50 Nicholas Countians joined together May 19 at the Carlisle United Methodist Church for the 11th annual

Peggy Seithers, the Health Education Director for WEDCO District Health Department, was present for the celebration, and shared some very disturbing news about the rate of occurrence of cancer for Nicholas Countians. Included in the team's day were visits to the Jockey International plant in Carlisle and the Blue Licks Battlefield State Park.
Nicholas County High School graduate Ryan Hunter, a student at Centre College in Danville, has been named to the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference Academic Honor Roll for the fall 2001 Semester. He is a participant in Centre's varsity football program.
The National Junior Honor Society chapter at Nicholas County Elementary & Middle School held its annual induction ceremonies last Friday in the school gymnasium. Thirty two students were inducted as new members. May 19, 1997
Carlisle property owners who

have swimming pools and/or outdoor furnaces or similar free standing heating devices must have fences around them. Carlisle City Council had second reading and passage of an amendment to the Code of Ordinances to require the protective fencing.
The Administrative Office of the Courts has agreed to pay 52.4 percent of the project costs for the repair of the Nicholas County Courthouse, as it did for the roof repair project completed the previous year.
Nicholas County Fiscal Court has signed new agreements with the Big Sandy Juvenile Detention Center in Prestonsburg and the Montgomery County Detention Center for housing people charged with criminal activities. The agreements were signed at the regular monthly meeting of the fiscal court on May 13.
May 21, 1992
The 1992 primary election will be held May 26 and, aside from questions of voter turnout, Nicholas County and Kentucky voters will be asked to choose a presidential candidate for a post as sixth district Representative for the United States Congress
Redistricting of the Nicholas County magisterial districts was passed at the last meeting of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court. However, for the May primary,

the county redistricting, with its obvious requirement to alter voting precedents throughout the county, will not be implemented until the November election.
Charles Watkins, former chairman of the Nicholas County Water District, responded angrily to implications made at the last City Council meeting that the former water district board left the utility organization in a state of financial distress. Watkins, who served as a member and chairman of the water district for 28 years, expressed dismay over the reported discussion between new board chairman Garvey Curtsinger and the Carlisle City Council during the regular council meeting on May 11.
May 21, 1987
The Carlisle-Nicholas County Senior Citizens Center will not be moving the old Nicholas county Jail. The center has yet another home where it is scheduled to be relocated by July 1, 1987. Shirley Vice, director of the center, came before the members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court at its regular meeting Wednesday, May

13, with a request to allow the center to move to the old Western Auto building on Main Street, rather than the old jail building on the corner of Main Street and Elm Street.
Nicholas County will not be directly affected by a Casey County Circuit Court ruling. Last week, the Casey County court ruled the 1 percent payroll occupational tax levied by Casey Fiscal Court unconstitutional. That ruling, according to Nicholas County officials, will only affect Casey County.
The Bluegrass Regional Private Industry and Development Council is now developing plans for the 1987 Summer Youth Employment program. This work-experience oriented program is funded through the Job Training Partnership Act and is identified as Title IIB. According to the Cartmell Lester, committee member of JTPA for Carlisle-Nicholas County, there are 29 positions available in Nicholas county.
