Sidles and Moss win by landslide

Although less

half of the registered voters cast their ballot during Tuesday's election in Nicholas County, the ones who did spoke loud and clear by handing landslide victories to Jeff "Bubba" Sidles for the office of Nicholas County Sheriff and electing Martha Moss as the new County Clerk.

Nicholas County had a 39 percent voter turnout with approximately 2,120 votes being cast from the 5,356 registered voters.

Sidles garnered almost 70 percent of the votes for Sheriff, with Moss garnering nearly 60 percent for County Clerk.



The results for the office of Sheriff of Nicholas County were as follows: candidate Mark Long received 201 votes; candidate Robert Bussell received 21 votes; candidate Kevin Booth received 305 votes; candidate Robert Carson received 42 votes; and candidate Sheriff Jeff Sidles received 1.409

Sidles carried each voting precinct by large margins.

The results for the office of County Clerk for Nicholas County were as follows: candidate Darlene Davis received 313 votes; candidate Tara R. Duncan received 114 votes; candidate Paula Gray Hunter received 186 votes; Deborah Fry-



man received 344 votes; and Martha Livingood Moss emerged victorious, receiving 1,027 votes and carrying each of the voter precincts by large margins.

The office of Jailer was won by Darren Robinson, due to the withdrawal of candidate James W. McGlothin, according to election officials.

The results for the United States Representative of 6th Congressional District primaries were also announced for Nicholas County. The results were as follows: candidate Patrick J. Kelly received 13 votes; candidate Curtis Kenimer received 18 votes; and candidate Andy Barr emerged victorious with

Also announced were the results of the G.O.P. primary for the Republican candidate for the President of the United States. The results were as follows: candidate Newt Gingrich received 2 votes; candidate Rick Santorum received 12 votes; candidate Ron Paul received 26 votes; and candidate Mitt Romney succeeded, receiving 67 votes. There were 8 committed votes cast for Nicholas County in this ballot.

The votes for office of the President of the United States were also tabulated. President Barack Obama emerged with 594 votes, though 698 uncommitted votes were also counted.

Nigerian Facebook scam targets local lady

Facebook Some friends aren't very friendly; In fact, they can be downright criminal! A local Carlisle Wom-

an, Leslie Archambeault, found that out recently after she began a friendly chat with a Nigerian man on Facebook, a very popular, social network Internet site.

The Nigerian man was all-too friendly, convinced Archambeault to believe in their friendship. He also led her to believe that she could make \$300 a month working from her home.

Archambeault received a package in the mail on Thursday May 17, which was wrapped in a brown paper bag and included approximately 80 or more money orders and checks totaling \$132, 264.00

The requirement for her to earn money was by cashing the money orders/checks and keeping a small portion while sending the bulk amount to the Nigeria. Archambeault

thought it was suspicious, and contacted the Carlisle Police Department to investigate. Officer Mark Snedegar responded to the call. "I have been in con-

tact with other counties that seem to be having the same issue." Snedegar said. "I am working closely with the Secret Services and KSP, to investigate this incident."

The money orders from Western Union and the US Postal Service were blank, with an exception of the amount \$865.55. Checks from Chase Bank were made for the amount of \$3,450.00, and forged Bank of America documents were made out in the amount of \$2,650.00. Both of the checks had an unidentified name on them. The money orders and checks were not made from normal watermark paper. They were from a heavier weight paper with a different texture, according to investiga-

According to Snedegar, the money involved in scams like these have been known to fund terrorist organizations. The source of this scam remains at least partially unknown. "I ask that everyone be

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

FRANKFORT, (May 17, 2012) – Motorists who refuse to wear their seat belts – beware. The 2012 national "Click It or Ticket" Memorial Day seat belt enforcement mobilization kicks off May 21 to help save lives by cracking down on those who don't buckle up.

Despite a wealth of data showing that seat belts save lives - and also despite implementation of a primary seat belt law – Kentucky's 82 percent seat belt usage rate lags behind the national rate of 84 percent. Therefore, the Kentucky Office of Highway Safety (KOHS) is supporting state and local law

enforcement across the

to strongly enforce seat belt laws around the clock.

"Kentucky undoubtedly experiences far too many fatalities that could have been avoided with the simple use of a seat belt," said Transportation Cabinet Secretary Mike Hancock. "Clearly this is an indication that people are not taking the law seriously or they are just not aware of the huge risk taken by not buckling up.'

There were 721 total highway fatalities in Kentucky in 2011 with 576 killed in motor vehicles. Fifty-eight percent of those killed in motor vehicles were not wear-

Hancock said the campaign this year will place extra emphasis on enforcement at nighttime, when fatal motor vehicle crashes are most likely to involve vehicle occupants who were not buckled up. Last year, 67 percent of people killed in crashes between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. were unrestrained.

Too many motorists don't realize the importance of wearing a seat belt, and are severely injured or killed because of it," said KOHS Director Bill Bell. "That's why officers are prepared to ticket anyone not buckled up. No warnings and no excuses.'

The KOHS awarded

federal funds to 64 state and local police agencies across the Commonwealth to help bolster seat belt enforcement during the campaign. The funding is provided through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHT-SA).

Although enforcement officers will be prevalent during the campaign, Bell emphasized, "The 'Click It or Ticket' campaign is not about writing tickets. It's about awareness and saving lives, and we are honored to have a family from Kentucky to help spread this message."

The family of Megan Miller of Owensboro is public service announcements airing statewide during the enforcement campaign. Megan was killed at age 17 when she was ejected from a vehicle crash.

"For her not to be wearing her seat belt that one day is all it took," says brother Myl-

es. "You just don't think you will ever lose a child that young," says moth-er Mischelle. "We miss her so much, and we wanted to do these commercials in her memory. We know she will make a difference.

According to NHTSA, seat belts, when worn correctly, reduce the risk of fatal injury to front-seat by 45 percent – and by 60 percent in pickup trucks, SUVs and mini-

While this year's "Click It or Ticket" enforcement mobilization runs May 21 through June 3, motorists should know that officers are out enforcing seat belt

laws year-round. "Motorists buckle up every time they go out, both day and night," said Bell.



Hannah Mills, a recent graduate of Nicholas County High School, was recognized for her accomplishments at a recent Board of Education meeting. Mills recently placed first in an art competition for her work in the area of fashion design. She was presented with a certificate by Superintendent Gregory Reid for her achievements.

Also discussed during the meeting were financial and construction projects to be implemented during the 2012-2013 school year.

The Nicholas County School system will receive a \$5,000 grant from Lowe's for playground renovation and school beautification. The funds received will be spent to repair and replace playground equipment at the elementary school. A motion was made to accept the grant. The motion was passed.

Next, a discussion was held in the matter of repairing the floors in the elementary school. It was announced that the lowest bid has come from a business in Scottsdale, Arizona to replace the tile floor in the classrooms, corridors and restrooms, as well as replacing the rubber treading on the stairs in the school. This project will cost the school system approximately \$154,800. Although there will be a 2 week period before a contract signing will take place, the business will likely hire locally to complete the project. The floors will be installed in late June and early July and will be ready before school begins in August.

Also mentioned was the consideration to submit an application for the Kentucky Fruit and Vegetable Grant. This grant would allow the students from preschool to 6th grade to be given fruits and vegetables throughout the school day. Although the application is only given to a select few schools, the winners will be given between \$35,000 and \$50,000 as a federal initiative to encourage a healthy diet among young students. A motion was made to approve the submittal of the application for this grant. The motion was passed.

Several other issues were discussed in the

meeting. Including: The meal prices





for the 2012-2013 school year were approved. The new price for the school lunch is \$1.75 for students. The breakfast prices will remain the same, as well as the pric-

Contention over budget prolongs fiscal court meeting

Judge Lyons and Nicholas County's magistrates - Steve Hamilton, Jeff Randolph, Darvin Mitchell, Mike Webb, and Jimmy Wells - had recently spent an entire day during a budget workshop hashing out their differences to come up with a county budget. Magistrate Hamilton insisted that the county needed to set aside money in a "rainy day" CD. Wanda Dotson, County Treasurer said that this "rainy day" money was currently being used to balance the budget. "We are going to spend this money,

"Take the \$56 out of my pay - I'm sick and tired of this," Dotson said. Dotson reminded the Magistrates that an approved budget had to be given to Frankfort in 30 days. Hamilton then said that he would only approve the budget if the \$50,000 was set aside and if the Mathers Fund salaries were set back to their original amounts until the Attorney General provides an opinion. Judge Lyons had to bring the meeting back to order after Dotson, Hamilton and Wells began arguing amongst themselves. The Magistrates eventually agreed to approve the first reading of the budget with two separate motions, one approving the "rainy day" fund of \$50,000 and another in which the Mathers Fund salaries were set at the amount allotted until the Attorney General issues his opinion.

Mercury Memories

Nicholas County resident and conservation officer William Allan Earlywine helped save the life of fellow conservation officer Corey Ellis following the tragic boating accident on the Licking River on May 14. 




