## Suspected Arson in Nicholas County

The Nicholas County Fire Department was called to respond to a series of fires in the rural area of Nicholas County on Friday night and again on Monday night.

Calls came in to post approximately around 10:00 p.m. with structure fires reported on Crooked Creek/Johnson Road. The fires consisted of three sheds and two barns. Emergency personnel responded in a timely fashion. Sheriff Sidles demanded that the roads be shut down and every motorist be stopped and present identification upon the investigation.

"This was obviously done intentionally," said a resident of Johnson Road, who requested not to be identified. "With this many fires in this small of an area, set at the same time, this is not a coincidence. Someone needs to be held responsible."

While emergency per-



sonnel were responding to the fires on Johnson Road, a county fire truck overturned on the Lake Road. This incident required that the City Fire Department be dispatched out on traffic control.

According to those on the scene, the truck was heading towards US Highway 68 on Lake Road in Nicholas County when the driver met an oncoming vehicle in the

truck's lane. Sources say that the opposing vehicle was traveling at a rate of 40-45 miles per hour. This forced the fire truck to careen into the adjacent ditch. Upon hitting the ditch, the fire truck began to tumble, coming to rest upside-down in a nearby yard. Fortunately those in the truck were able to escape and no one was seriously injured.

Despite the lack of serious injury, however, the

circumstances of the accident have been determined to be more severe than originally anticipated.

According to Curtis Combs, the Kentucky State Arson Investigator, this accident has dire consequences for those responsible for the fires in rural Nicholas County.

"This accident makes the arson much more



severe," said Combs. "If a firefighter is injured en route to a fire that was set intentionally, it automatically increases the charge to 1st Degree Arson, which, if found guilty, the responsible party could serve a sentence of 20 years to life in prison. This case is currently being investigated by Kentucky's Arson Task Force and the Federal Bureau of Investigation"

The Kentucky State Arson Task Force is currently offering a \$1,000 reward to anyone who can offer any information regarding the fire and those responsible. ## Darrell Layne Reinstated

More than 30 citizens of Carlisle were present at a recent special called meeting of the Carlisle

City Council. The meeting was called to hold a hearing for then former Carlisle Chief of Police Darrell Layne, who is allegedly accused of violating Carlisle Police Department standard oper-

ating procedures.

The hearing for Layne took place on Friday afternoon and soon became a high-profile event even before the meeting was called to order. The small room slowly started to fill and before long, chairs soon became scarce. The standing-room only crowd waited patiently for Carlisle Mayor Kevin Booth to call the meeting to order.

Mayor Booth called the meeting to order at approximately 3 p.m. After calling the meeting to order, Mayor Booth informed Mr. Layne and his counsel that the hearing could either be held in closed session or

open session.

After a brief discussion, Mr. Layne was advised by his attorney to have the hearing held as a closed executive session. Upon this request, the majority of those attending the hearing were asked to leave. This left only the members of the Carlisle City Council, Mayor Kevin Booth, Mr. Layne, and Blaze Tomlin, Layne's Attorney.

During the executive session, which lasted no less than one hour and 40 minutes, all those who were formerly sitting in the office, were now gathered in the adjacent alley. As the events of the hearing began to garner

more spectators and supporters, several people took seats on the sidewalk, wondering what would come of Layne. Several people even tried to sneak glances of the proceedings through a gap in a side window.

After the lengthy closed session, people were informed that a decision has been made and that they could now reenter the office. Before anyone could enter the office, However, City Council member Billy Gaunce hastily left the room and made his way around the corner and down the street, visibly distraught and upset.

Upon entering the

city office, everyone was asked to be seated and remain quiet. After calling the meeting back into open session, Carlisle Mayor Kevin Booth made an announcement to the members of the council and the community.

"As of today, I am immediately reinstating Chief Layne back into full duty," said Booth. "He will receive back pay. We're going to get this city and the county moving forward."

Mayor Booth's announcement was met with a roaring applause by the majority of those present.

## Property taxes take on new look

As the cooler weather approaches, the dreadful times of property taxes are approaching but with a new look.

Nicholas County Sheriff Sidles and his staff are working on preparing the property taxes for the 2012 tax year. This year the tax bills will have a new design and texture. In

previous years the bill was mailed as a carbon copy, but that created difficulty reading the amounts. The new bills will be on a white card stock texture that will be folded, similar to a water bill but not a single sheet.

This will not only better serve the citizens with a better legible tax bill, but it is also more cost efficient.

"With mailing out the new tax bills, it cost the county less

than the carbon copy bills from the past," Sidles said, "Every citizen needs to be aware of the new bill so they won't throw them away."

The new tax bills will be mailed towards the end of the month of October. Citizens should start seeing them in their mailboxes by the first of November.

Be sure to notice on the bill that the discount dates are incorrect. Sheriff Sidles

has stamped the correct dates that citizens need to go by. Those dates are:

Discount Period - Nov 1 thru 30

Face Amount - Dec 1 thru 21

5% Penalty - Jan 1 thru 31

21% penalty - Feb 1

## Heaven Is A Lot Like Kentucky

Life is better with dogs.

I've pretty much "unplugged" from my weekly routine of information-gathering while enjoying a few days of vacation from The Kentucky News Group.

My primary duties with KNG include reporting and editing the Flemingsburg Gazette Newspaper and reporting as needed for our other fine publications.

There's been no shortage of news lately and this summer, I like several in my past, has literally blurred by once again under the stealthy and rhythmic mechanics of the weekly deadline.

I've said it before and I'll say it again, "Deadlines are a brutal and unforgiving entity."

Yet the weekly deadline and grunge of gathering information in our region leads to many things, though boredom does not number among them.

I've never had a boring week in the past decade.

There's always something going on.

News never sleeps.

But for those of us in the busi-

ness, who actually leave the comforts of the desk and the newsroom to travel out to where the news dwells; to beat the bushes and pavements and boardrooms and hallways of government buildings, there's nothing as sweet as a few days off in a row occasionally, to fall back and regroup.

If you don't believe me, just ask me.

I've got a little bonfire area in my backyard in rural Fleming County. Sometimes I sit in my Dollar-store chair in my backyard; near the far back end, where some of my former dogs are buried.

I gaze out over the meadows where those dogs and the ones still above ground have played for the past quarter of a century.

It's a good quiet and peaceful place to reflect and think about things.

The other day I was watching a couple of Mon-

arch butterflies dancing above the mounded up area where Snowy and Wizard and Nana and a few other dogs are buried.

The wildflowers on their graves draw the atten-

tion of butterflies, bees and other insects.

Looking upon such things calms me when I am upset or my mind is troubled over the course of events I encounter.

The relationship between human and animal is as rich as it is diverse, among those of us who call Kentucky our home.

Such has been the case for hundreds and thousands of years here.

I believe several groups of Native Americans domesticated several species of bird and mammal while living in Kentucky.

They probably even had their own versions of domesticated fish farms along the many streams and lakes of the region; but I must confess that it has been the relationship between humans and dogs over the wrinkles of time that has always fascinated me the most.

I continue to research "dog burials" found among Native American villages in Kentucky.

Around five once again of Nip

and Tuck, two hunting dogs of early Kentucky Frontiersman Simon Kenton. Many winter nights in the desolation of the Kentucky woods the dogs and Kenton slept together curled up beneath a buffalo hide with a buried and smoldering fire just below them under a thin layer of dirt. When Kenton returned to Kentucky as an old man he told the early residents of the Upper Licks in southern Fleming County that losing Nip and Tuck was among the greatest sorrows he ever endured. The trio had been hunting near the Licking River when Kenton shot a buffalo bull and Nip and Tuck attacked the wounded animal. Kenton could do nothing to help as the dogs and buffalo slipped down a frozen hill and onto the ice covered Licking River. The ice cracked and Nip and Tuck

thousand years ago the Native Americans who lived along the Green River in Ohio County in southwestern Kentucky began burying dogs independently and among their own dead. A total of 21 dog burials were found on the rich Kentucky archaeological site, excavated seven decades ago by University of Kentucky and WPA archaeologists.

The dogs were small in stature, something akin to a Chihuahua but slightly larger. But dog burials found in association with humans is a practice that was utilized across the globe for millennium.

Puppy skeletons found with a child burial in northern Israel over 12,000 years ago have been documented by archaeologists.

I wonder how many beloved dogs and other former pets today have their own respectful graves in the backyards and farms of northeastern Kentucky inhabitants.

I am reminded

drowned before Kenton could reach them.

Kenton wept as he related the story to Fielding Belt, members of the Finley family and other residents of Upper Licks, as he pointed out the location of the tragedy so many years ago.

My own dog of nearly 14 years, Brandy, sleeps on an Indian blanket a few feet away on my couch, as I type this column on an autumn morning.

She's a good dog, but like me she's getting a little grouchier every winter.

I hope our winter isn't too harsh this time around.

I hope the Licking River doesn't freeze over like it has often in the past.

I hope me and my dog; and you and yours, make it through this pending winter until spring, with little or no damage, dear reader.

Life is better with dogs.



## Jackets drop district game to Raceland

The Nicholas County Bluejackets had a four-game winning streak stopped on Friday night, falling to visiting Raceland. Visiting Raceland secured an early lead and pulled away to beat the Bluejackets 60-12.

With the win, Raceland improved to 6-1 overall and opened district play 1-0. The Rams notched their fifth straight win.

The Jackets dropped to 5-2 overall and started district competition 0-1 after suffering the loss.

Nicholas County hadn't lost since falling to familiar foe Fleming County in Week 1. The Jackets dropped a

game to the Panthers following a 32-16 victory over Lewis County in the Rec Bowl at Montgomery County.

In seven games, Raceland has outscored opponents 344-111. The Rams also own wins over East Carter, Pikeville, Greenup County, Scioto County, Scioto County Community (Ohio) and Lawrence County.

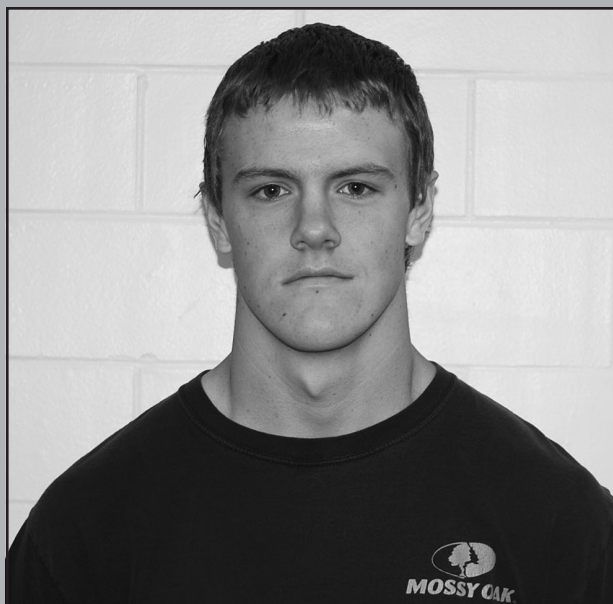

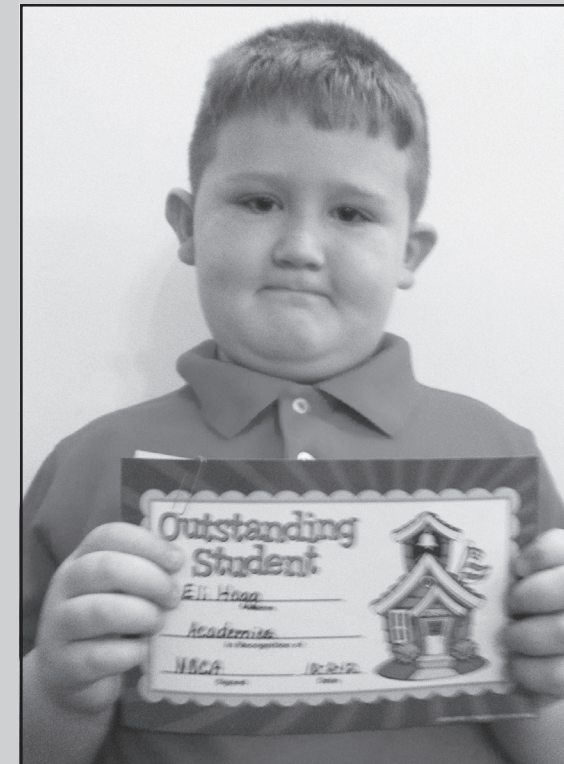
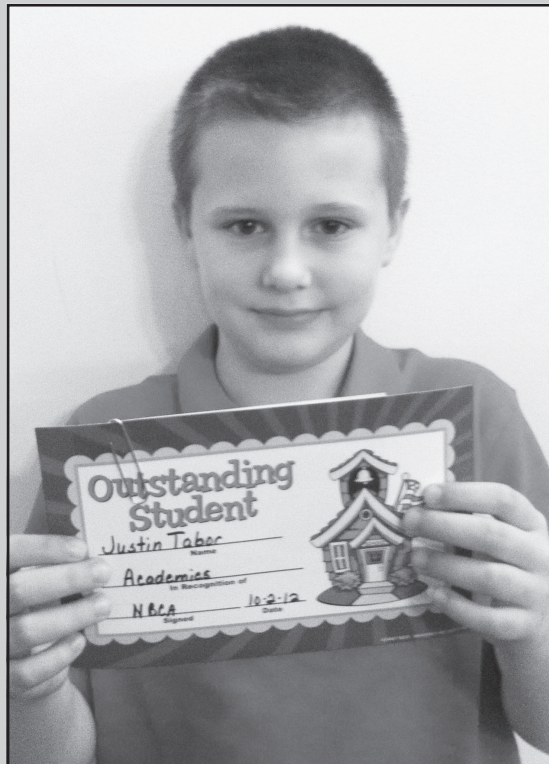

# City Projects and Upcoming Events Discussed at City Council Meeting

Concerns regarding property ownership and the city water project were among the many items discussed at the recent regular meeting of the Carlisle City Council, held Monday evening at 7 p.m. Jerry Gilbert and Larry Noe, representatives from Sav-A-Lot, expressed some concerns to the Carlisle City Council regarding property issues at the newly remodeled Sav-A-Lot store in Carlisle. According to Noe, a portion of the building in which the store is located happens to reside on city property. This brings up an issue in which the area beside the building is located adjacent to a city street. Known as Water Street, there is a portion of traffic that travels the area. It was suggested by the council that there could be steel posts set up to prevent traffic from traveling the street. A motion was made by Doug Garrett for the council to consider undertaking this project. A second to the motion was made by Tommy Crawford. The motion passed.

Since this project would require a certain amount of construction on the city's part, the Carlisle City Council must hold two hearings in order to approve the plans. The first reading of the project plans will be held at the next regular meeting of the council on November 12, with a second reading to be determined at a later date.

A reading of Resolution number 4, regarding the Carlisle City Waterline Replacement project, was also held. According to the resolution, the City of Carlisle would be responsible for any damages or demolition done to any homes during the project. This ordinance is known as the Antidisplacement and Relocation Act. If a home encounters any damage or demolition, the City of Carlisle will be held responsible for the repair or reconstruction of the building.

The City of Carlisle will also provide housing to individuals until the building of a new house can be possible. The City of Carlisle also will be responsible for locating safe, decent and sanitary housing conditions and will encourage the occupants of the house to seek utilization of

housing project and adoption of housing codes.

A motion was made by Tommy Crawford for the City of Carlisle to adopt Resolution number 4. A second to the motion was made by Eugene Hall. The motion was passed.

In addition to these, several events were announced by Mayor Booth and the City Council. Including:

- Fall Cleanup Week will take place on the week of Octo-

ber 22-26. This project is to encourage the citizens of Carlisle to clean the city up and make it manageable and habitable.

- Replacing the halogen street light bulbs to LED lights. Currently, the annual electric bill costs the city \$600 per year for every light. Mayor Booth stated that doing this would save the city a large sum of money on annual electric bills. Booth also mentioned that, according to studies,

a bright white light, as opposed to yellow halogen lights, deters crime and keeps the streets safer for children and citizens.

- Trick or Treat-

ing will take place in the city of Carlisle on Halloween, October 31st, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.

A motion to adjourn the meeting

was made by John Jones. A second to the motion was made by Doug Garrett. The motion carried and the meeting was adjourned.

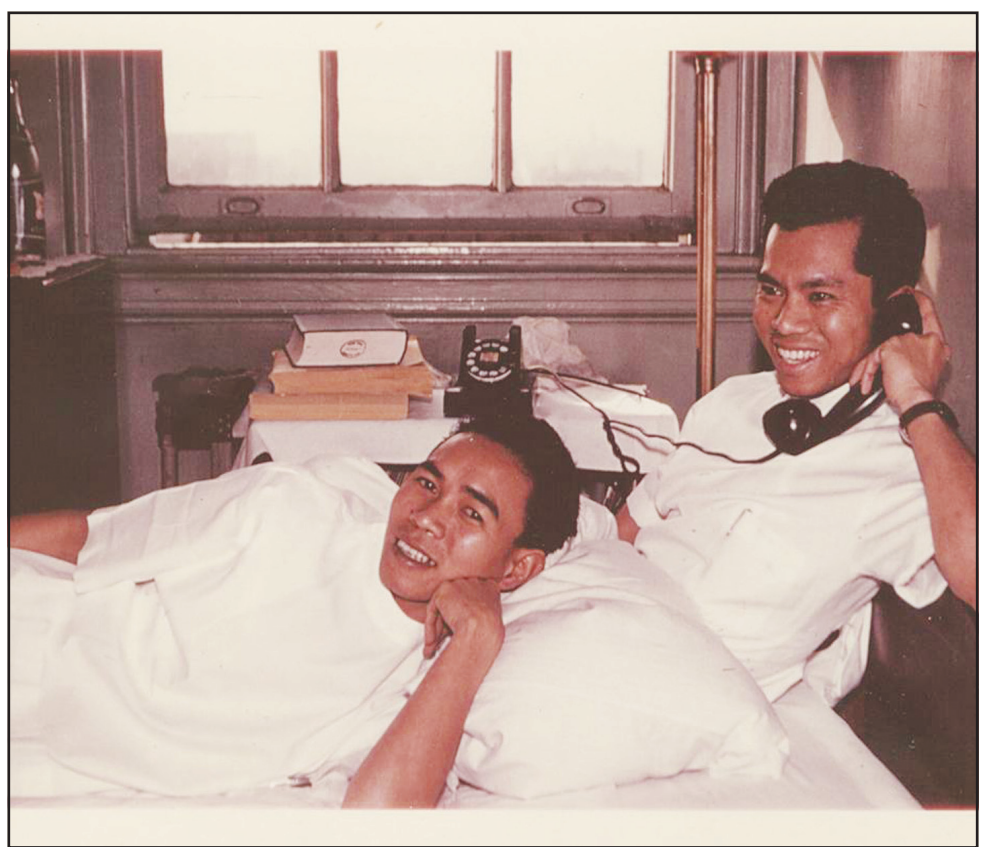

Dr. Osias Villafior's "American Dream" officially got underway on January 26, 1959. That's the day his airplane touched down in Baltimore, Maryland, USA. It must have been impossible to imagine what an amazing journey laid before him as he walked down the steps of the airplane. Surely, he was dreaming of success and happiness that day, but if you asked Dr. Villafior when he first developed his dream to heal, he would tell you that it was many years earlier during World War II.

"Osie" was born the youngest of 10 children into a family of farmers in the Visayan islands of the Philippines. Fiercely independent folks, the Villafiors rose up to fight against the Japanese invasion of their homeland in 1942. The family helped arm and feed the Filipino resistance, eventually being forced to move into the mountains to evade the in-

vaders. These two years "on the run", away from school, would later make Dr. Villafior one of the oldest members of his medical school graduating class.

It was during the conflict that the Filipino resistance fighters came into possession of a prisoner of war. Their homes burned, their crops stolen, the fighters naturally wanted revenge. But the prisoner was no infantryman, he was a Japanese Imperial Army doctor. Realizing the value of having a doctor, Osie's father took the officer under his protection and convinced the townspeople to spare him. In gratitude, the doctor, though an enemy, tended to the sick and injured Filipinos. Dr. Villafior would later say that seeing how his father's compassion for the captured doctor was repaid in-kind convinced him that his calling was to bring compassion and healing to others.

Years later, after the war, Osie's family was prepared to put him on a boat bound for college in Manila. The elder Villafior had decided that his youngest son should become a teacher. The family believed in the power of education. Osie had half-heartedly agreed to his father's wishes but just before boarding the boat, he made a heartfelt plea to his father to allow him to pursue a medical degree instead. Seeing the passion in his youngest son's eyes, Osie's father agreed.

During medical school, Osie met a certain Miss Virginia Ruby Rovillos. She was from the north, he was from the south, they went to different churches, they grew up speaking different languages and, frankly, her family didn't really trust anyone from his island. Against improbable odds, the two found love and made plans to marry and immigrate to America. As nurses were

in high demand, Ruby came first while Doctor Villafior finished training in Manila. Osie followed and took up residency at Johns Hopkins University where he completed further training in general surgery, obstetrics & gynecology, and orthopedic surgery.

Dr. and Mrs. Villafior's path to Carlisle found them and their growing family making stops in Baltimore, West Virginia, and Upstate New York. Of course, by the time they got to Carlisle in 1982, Osie knew that he had come home. Many Carlislians share similar stories of asking Doc how he liked Carlisle and hearing him reply, "I'll be buried here." Our little slice of the Bluegrass farmland reminded him of where he grew up. More importantly, the honest, hard-working nature of our people reminded him of the people he knew growing up. He felt that he could make a differ-

ence here and he did. From an early age, Dr. Villafior learned that sometimes you have to be a rebel. Nowhere was that more evident than in his outspoken support of the Nicholas County Hospital. Whenever there was a choice to fight for our hospital or stand idly by and watch it close, he fought. Not only did he fight, he inspired others to fight. The doors to that hospital are held open today by the sheer force of will of those who chose action over inaction.

Osie understood that great things come from hard work. "Work hard" and "do your best" were frequent pieces of advice given to his four children and 11 grandchildren. And for Dr. Villafior, it didn't matter if he was a teenager tending crops on an island in the Pacific or a doctor seeing a patient at 2 in the morning, he always followed his own advice. In fact, Osie kept working hard

and doing his best until he simply could not go on. Retirement was never a serious consideration until there was no other option.

Fate is peculiar. That young doctor who touched down in Baltimore on a winter day in 1959 with nothing more than a suitcase and a passion for healing brought something quite unique and irreplaceable to our city. As our family mourns his passing, we know that we aren't the only ones who lost someone special. We thank everyone for the cards and the flowers and the hugs. Osie would be proud to see how the compassion that he showed his many patients over the years is being repaid to his family now. After all, the idea of spreading compassion from one person to another inspired his incredible journey. Thank you for giving him 31 incredible years here in Carlisle!

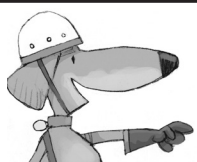

## Fatal Collision in Robertson County

The Dry Ridge Post of the Kentucky State Police received a call at 11:07 p.m. on October 4, 2012 of a single vehicle collision at the intersection of KY 617 and KY 1467. Clyde Brown, 52,

of Mount Olivet was operating a 1996 Ford pickup traveling west on KY 1467. Mr. Brown left the roadway on the left side and struck an earth embankment and coming to rest on the vehicle's side. Upon arrival of EMS the passenger Mary Littleton, 52, of Mount Olivet was unresponsive and

was later pronounced deceased by the Robertson County Coroner at the scene. Clyde Brown was air lifted to UK Medical Center in Lexington. Alcohol is suspected and tests are pending on Clyde Brown. The incident remains under investigation by Trooper Ryan Roessler.
