City Council Holds First Reading of New Tax Ordinance

A special meeting of the Carlisle City Council was held Monday evening to discuss tax increases for the coming year.

A meeting was held Friday evening to discuss these tax increases.

However, there were not enough Council members present in order for the reading to take place. Four members are required, yet only three were present. The council members not present were unable to attend due to health reasons or prior engagements.

Although there are some changes with tax rates, watercraft and automobile taxes will remain the same as the previous year.

The tax rate on real estate will increase to .195 for every \$100 spent. A motion was made to accept this increase by Eugene Hall. A second to the motion was made by Doug Garrett. The motion passed by a vote of 4 to 1.

After Ordinance 3 2012 was read, the first reading of this ordinance was passed by City Council. A motion to accept was made by Betty Jo Booth. A second to the motion was made by Tommy Crawford. The motion passed unanimously.

The taxes for the per-

sonal property within the city limits will increase to 0.45 per \$100 spent. A motion was made by Tommy Crawford to approve this new tax rate. A second to the motion was made by Betty Jo Booth. The first reading of this ordinance passed.

The taxes for motor vehicles will remain 0.35 for every \$100 spent. A motion to accept the terms of this ordinance was made by Betty Jo Booth. A second to the motion was made by Eugene Hall. The motion passed and this ordinance will take effect on January 1, 2013, should it pass the second reading.

These changes to taxes for individuals living within the Carlisle city will generate an income of \$4,874.36 for the City of Carlisle.

Due to the necessity of

this ordinance requiring two readings before October 1, a second reading of this ordinance will take place on Tuesday, September 25 at 7 p.m. at the Carlisle City Office.

A motion was made by Eugene Hall to adjourn the meeting. A second to the motion was made by John Jones. The motion passed and the meeting was adjourned.

"This year's tax increase is only a penny over last year's tax rate," said Michelle McDonald, Nicholas County's Property Valuation Administrator. "The tax rate averages out to approximately two dollars for every \$50,000 of worth. The revenue that this tax increase will go into the budget of the City of Carlisle to fund community projects."

The Carlisle City Fire Department has purchased an equipment tray for their fire van, which is used to house and transport the equipment that the fire department needs when they respond to fires and other emergencies.

The tray, a Bedslide 1000, is used to make the firefighters' equipment more accessible when they are responding to emergencies. The tray holds their coats, helmets, pants, oxygen tanks and other equipment that they may need.

To purchase these trays, the fire department used money that they raised at the Blackberry Festival. The cost of this piece of equipment was approximately \$900.

"We run the fire department on a very tight budget," says Fire Chief Jim Biddle. "But we set up booths at the Blackberry Festival and Saturday in Car-

One of the most discussed aspects of the document was the matter of the animal shelter taking in stray animals. According to the drafted procedures, the animal shelter is currently mandated to accept dropoffs.

Magistrate Jeff Randolph appeared somewhat concerned about certain aspects of the policies; especially an aspect of the policies would make pick up of animals voluntary.

"I really don't want to open up a can of worms on this one," said Randolph. "We can't just run around the county picking up every dog someone gets tired of."

It was mentioned that a fee for animal drop-off would be very beneficial to cutting down the amount of excessive drop-offs.

There was some concern over the matter of euthanasia and some of the animals that are recovered. It was stressed by members of the Animal Welfare Society that euthanasia is only acceptable in emergency situations and is not taken lightly. But it was also stressed that the first priority is human safety if an animal is exceptionally aggressive.

A motion was made that the procedures of the Animal Advisory Board would be adopted, pending review by County Attorney, Dawn Letcher. The motion was made by Darvin Mitchell. A second to the motion was made by Jimmy Wells. The motion was passed. was passed.

There was also a discussion regarding the speed limits on rural roads within the county. In order to post speed limits on rural roads, they have to be passed by an ordinance. To make citizens aware of the speed limits, signs will have to be posted on the roads. It was stressed that people could take advantage if the speed limits are not posted and advertised. In order to determine proper speed limits, Nicholas County Judge-Executive Kenny Lyons said that it would be possible to get an official from the University of Kentucky to come down and determine recommendations of the road conditions, so they can be approved by the Fiscal Court.

A motion was made to adjourn the meeting by Jimmy Wells. A second to the motion was made by Jeff Randolph. The meeting was adjourned.

Secretary Grimes Reports Absentee Ballots Are on **Their Way to Military Voters**

The November 6, 2012, General Election is only six weeks away, and Sec-retary of State Alison Lundergan Grimes reports that Kentucky's county clerks started sending absentee ballots to military and other eligible voters last week.

"The process of receiving, filling out, and returning an absentee ballot can take weeks, especially for active-duty military mem-bers," said Grimes. "I en-courage all eligible citizens to make sure they are registered to vote and submit their absentee ballot requests promptly.

Kentuckians can check their registration status, obtain a voter registration card and review information related to the upcoming General Election at the Secretary of State's website, www.sos.ky.gov. Resources for military and overseas U.S. citizens are also located on the Secretary of State's website. In an effort to reach all eligible voters, direct links to these items are highlighted on the Secretary of State's Facebook page. Members of the military and their families and overseas U.S. citizens can find additional information on registering to vote and requesting an absentee ballot via the Federal Post Card Application by visiting www.fvap. gov

returned from a trip to the Middle East to assess and improve military vot-ing, said, "Many of the men and women in uniform I had the privilege to meet during my trip to the Middle East sought reassurance that their ballots are actually counted. As the Commonwealth's Chief Election Official, removing these doubts and ensuring that our troops have the opportunity to have their voices heard is a priority."

Under Kentucky law, ballots for the November 6th General Election were required to be printed at least 50 days before the election, or Šeptember 17, 2012. Absentee ballots that were validly requested prior to that date were required to be transmitted no later three days thereafter, or September 20, 2012. Absentee ballots validly requested after September 17th will be transmitted within three days after the application is received.

For all voters, the deadline to register to vote is October 9, 2012, and the deadline to apply for a mail-in absentee ballot is October 30, 2012. In order to be counted, executed absentee ballots must be received by the county clerk no later than 6 p.m., local time, on November 6, 2012. In-person absentee voting will be open in all counties at least 12 business days before the election.

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Wooten to Attempt Potentially Life-Altering Escape

Magician and escapist Reed Wooten will attempt a potentially life-altering escape at his annual Halloween show.

"I've been performing magic and escapes since I was 6, and I've been performing professionally for five years," said Reed. "I just wanted to step my act up a notch."

With help from his assistant Ashton Nicole, will attempt the classic straight jacket escape, which has been performed by many accomplished magicians including Harry Houdini and David Copperfield.

While this particular escape carries a great difficulty and risk, Reed assures that he has taken proper precautions.

"While the explosion won't be large enough to kill me," stated Reed. "It could result in extreme burns or loss of hands or other body parts if I don't succeed. Paramedics will be on hand if the worst should happen."

Reed Wooten will be attempting this escape as the finale to this year's Halloween themed illusion show at Rohs Opera House in Cynthiana, Kentucky. The show is set to take place on October 27 at 7:30. Tickets will be ten dollars for adults 13 and older and 7 for children.

"I strongly encourage you to buy your tickets in advance," said Reed. "We've sold out the last four years, and we've had to turn people away at the door."

Robertson County received a check for \$200,000 for road repairs at the recent meeting of the Robertson County Fiscal Court on Wednesday morning.

Robertson County Judge-Executive Billy Allison called the regular meeting of the Robertson County Fiscal Court to order at 9 a.m. last Wednesday to discuss community projects and matters of funding within the county.

Tom McKee, State Representative of Kentucky's 78th District (which includes Robertson, Harrison, Pendleton and Southern Campbell Counties) presented the Fiscal Court with a check in the amount of \$200,000. The money given to the county will go towards the repair of county roads.

"One of the main concerns within the county is the matter of road conditions," said Allison. "We definitely have some roads that are in major need of repair so that drivers can travel safely. This money will definitely help make the roads safer."

Also, the members of the

Fiscal Court discussed the matter of a Bridge Agree-Resolution. This ment resolution would allow five bridges within the county to come into possession of the county. This would allow them to make necessary repairs, so as to make travel much easier. Ricky Myers made a motion to allow Judge-Executive Allison to sign the resolution. Troy Martin made a second to the motion. The motion passed.

Approval to accept a Rural Secondary Road Agreement was also discussed in the meeting. The agreement would bring possession of the all roads contained within the county to become property of the county. A motion to accept the resolution was made by Dee Whitaker. A second to the motion was made by Terry Craecraft. The motion was passed.

The establishment of the county tax rate was also discussed by the Fiscal Court. It was determined by the members of the court to have the tax rates remain the same as last year's tax rate. A motion to keep all special district tax rates was made by Troy Martin. A second to the motion was

made by Dee Whitaker. The motion was passed.

The court also discussed the matter of accepting a five year plan for the county landfill. This plan was made to continue recycling and reducing sold waste within the county. A plan was also discussed to make the landfill last eight more years, although this matter will be

discussed in a future meeting. A motion was made to approve this plan by Sue Connelly. A second to the motion was made by Troy Martin. The motion was

passed.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Sue Connelly. The meeting was adjourned.
